Election

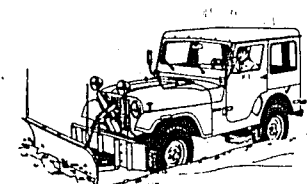
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In addition to Knox and Nantz, the terms of commissioners Marshall Gabriel and William Young expire, as do those of school board members William Harwell and Calvin Tyner.

For Temple Spinning Mills, Inc. and Chempun Yarns, Ltd., revealed that, without public announcement, wages of employees at these two plants had been increased in two increments since the general increase of 5½ per cent that was given the last week in December 1972.

The Temple-Chempun spokesman continued: "Effective April 23 a 4 per cent average increase was given to all second and third shift employees in the form of a shift bonus for work done on these shifts. Then commencing the work week of July 9 an additional increase averaging 4 per cent was given to all employees."

"In announcing the July increase to its employees, the Temple management said that if the rate of inflation continues at its present rapid pace and market conditions hold firm, they would consider a further pay increase before the end of the year."

"Temple-Chempun have also made increases in fringe benefits since the beginning of the year in the form of funeral pay, and a 1 per cent additional contribution to the Profit Sharing Plan."

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Marine World's request that municipal water and sewer service be extended to the proposed site, "and we have this under study."

Charles Davis, president of M. W. Development Co., said following the Planning Board hearing that he was delighted, overall, with reaction to Marine World plans in this area.

"We've enjoyed a real good reception," he said, "and, provided the county commissioners go along with the rezoning, we're ready to move on arrangements for water and sewer. I would say at this point chances of our using the Iredell site are excellent."

The 175-acre tract—being considered for development by Marine World is in the southwest quadrant of the N. C. 150-Interstate 77 intersection two and a half miles west of Mooreville. Marine World first planned to build its attraction near Davidson on Lake Norman, but rezoning delays, difficulties in securing water and sewer service and objections by citizens in that area caused the developers to look for alternate locations for part of its facility.
