Duke Completes \$50 Million Pollution Control Problem

Duke Power Company has announced the completion of a \$50 million air pollution control program that virtually has cleared the air over its coal burning power stations.

Just six years ago, despite the use of the best existing pollution control equipment, the tall stacks of the utility's generating stations permitted considerable amounts of flyash to settle on

the areas surrounding the plants. "No more," says Austin C. Tines, senior vice president of production and transmission. "We have just placed in service the Reverend No. 7 electrostatic precipitator, which completes the upgrading program we set for ourselves in 1967."
