All members are urged to attend and to take note of the change of the meeting date.

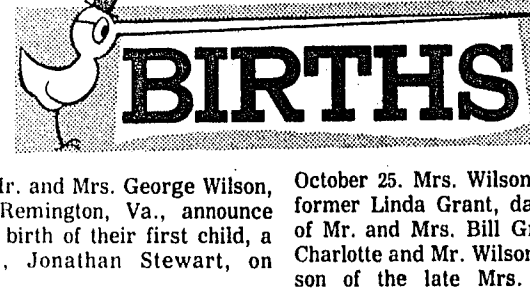

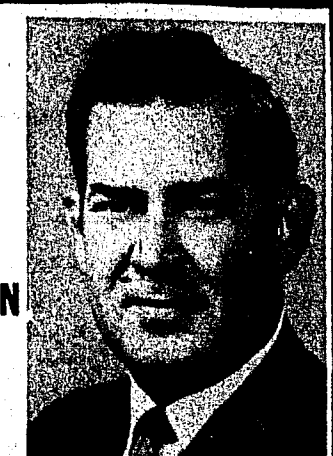
