State Adj. Gen. William M. Buck says he and Gov. Jim Holshouser are opposed to a National Guard Bureau proposal to relocate North Carolina's 30th Infantry Mechanized Division in another state.

"We would lose the division headquarters and the break-up would hurt the tradition of the division," Buck said Wednesday.

Under the proposal, a new troop list would be provided for North Carolina which would include a 30th infantry mechanized brigade.

A guard spokesman said the new troop list would increase the number of units in North Carolina as well as officers and enlisted men. The brigade

would give units a higher priority than those in the division now.

Buck and John Tolson III, state secretary of military and veterans affairs, have met with Maj. Gen. Francis Greenleaf, chief of the National Guard Bureau, to discuss the proposal.

"We're hoping that something can be worked out in negotiations whereby we won't lose the 30th division," Buck said.

The restructuring proposal would enable North Carolina to keep National Guard units in every town where units are now located.

The 30th Division, once known as the "Old Hickory Division," saw service in both world wars.

—Mrs. Jefford Chairs Effort To Publicize Bond Campaign

The November 6, 1973 election date will have several important issues for the people of the state to consider.

The \$300 million statewide bond referendum is one issue which is receiving organized support through a statewide group called SITE, Sound Investment In Tomorrow's Education.

In Mooreville, Mrs. Jack Jefford will serve as chairperson to coordinate the effort to inform the people and to work for passage of this referendum, which will yield to each school district a per capita share for new construction, renovation, additions and new equipment.

If bond issue passes, the Mooreville City Schools will be allocated \$64,450 which can be used for capital improvements.
