Members were encouraged to sell the straw flower pictures made in a workshop by club

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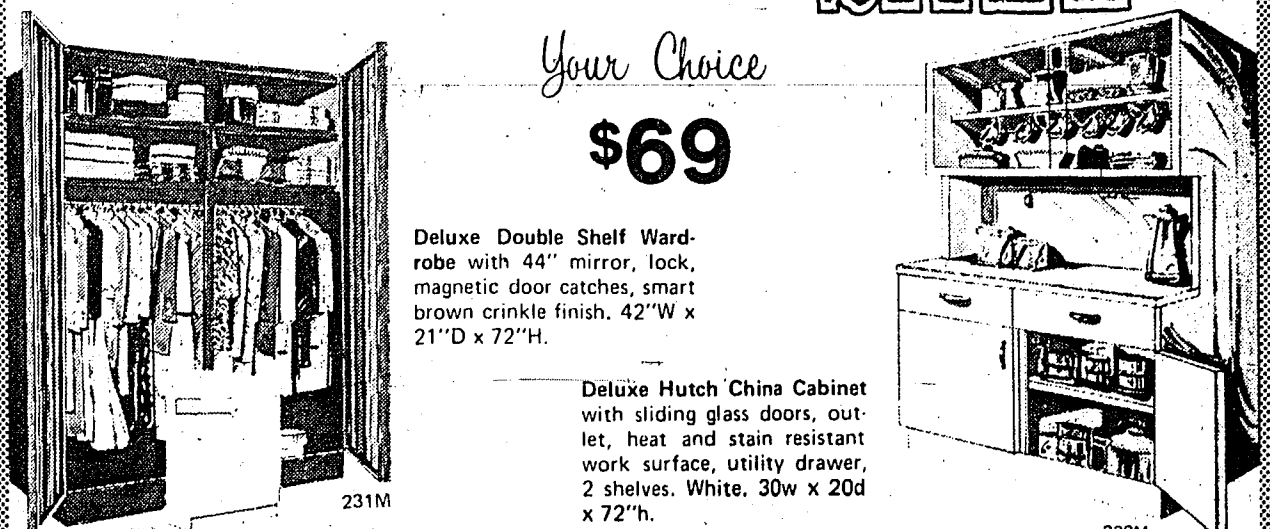
