## Social Security

### Questions and Answers

Q. My husband has become unable to work and a doctor told us it would be more than a year before he can work again. Is there any point in his applying for disability benefits before this waiting period is up?

A. Yes. Although disability benefits are not paid for the first 5 full calendar months (recently reduced from 6), he should apply within 23 months of becoming disabled. By applying soon after disability occurs, his first check should arrive when due. It is impossible to do this unless he applies very soon after he became disabled.

Q. My parents received Social Security benefits before they died. My brother tried to qualify as a disabled adult child on their record, but we were unable to establish he became disabled before age 18. Do any of the changes apply to him?

A. Possibly, as the age 18 has been raised to age 22. It would have to be established that he became disabled before age 22.

Q. Several years ago I had a Social Security card but haven't been working and can't locate my card. Can your office issue me a duplicate card?

A. Yes, if you can furnish the number that was on your card. Otherwise, your application for a card must be sent to our Baltimore office where your number is recorded. That office will issue and mail your duplicate card.

Q. I understand that under the new Federal Supplemental Security Income program certain individuals 65 or over can be paid up to \$130 a month, but couples can only be paid up to \$195.00 a month. This amounts to \$97.50 each for a husband and wife. What about a couple that has separated?

A. Under the Federal Supplemental Security Income program, a husband and wife who have been living apart more than 6 months would be considered as individuals rather than as a couple. Each could qualify for a payment of up to \$130 a month.

### July Bond Sales In Iredell County

Sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Iredell County during July, 1973, were \$118,302. January-July sales totaled \$83,341, or 64.7 per cent of the county's 1973 goal of \$12.8 million, according to W. H. Lee of Statesville, county volunteer chairman.

July sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in North Carolina amounted to \$5,796,008. Due to an early cut-off date, the period covered by this report does not include all of July 1973 sales. Consequently, it is not comparable with July 1972. Even though the figures are not complete, this year's July purchases exceed those of any July since 1945 (with the exception of July 1971 and 1972). January-July sales came to \$58,032,811—the best in 28 years, and 63 per cent above the same period last year.

Nationally, during July there were new purchases of E and H Bonds amounting to \$487 million, 1.1 per cent below 1972 sales of \$493 million. Total cash sales of E and H Bonds for the first seven months of 1973 amounted to \$4,010 million, 7.2 per cent above a year earlier. Sales exceeded redemptions, at cost price, for the 34th consecutive month. Holdings of E and H Bonds came to \$59.83 billion in July—an increase of \$233 million.

### Statesville Tough Assignment For Blue Devils Opener Friday

Mooresville's Senior High Blue Devils travel to Statesville tomorrow (Friday) for an 8 p. m. encounter with the cross-county rival Greyhounds. The defending North Piedmont champion Blue Devils, under new head coach Gary Karriker and assistants Roy Thompson and Glenn Barber, hope to start the season on a winning note against the defending South Piedmont champs.

Mooresville (11-2 last season) lost last year's opener to the Hounds 19-14. However the Blue Devils defeated Statesville 28-19 in NPC-SPC playoff game to advance to the association finals.

The Blue Devils will again use the explosive ever offense that netted an average of 368 yards total offense per game and scored 33.7 points per game in the 13 contests played last year.

Leading the offense will be honorable mention all state back David Mullis. The 5'10", 207 pound bulldozer gained 1,915 yards in 13 games and scored 151 points last year.

A second all conference re-

turnee of all state caliber, Johnny Walker, will team with Mullis in the backfield. Walker gained 948 yards last year in 12 games and scored 138 points.

Opening the holes in the Blue Devil offensive line will be returnees Len Mackey and Frank Craven at tackles, Dale Bravley at guard and Rick Mack at center. Bobby Beale is slated to open at the other guard post while Tony Hager will man one of the offensive end slots. The other end will come from a group of Tommy Rinehardt, Walter Leazer, Charles Walker, Dennis Huffman or Mike Wilhelm.

The quarterback slot will be manned by Bobby Craig, who has been battling with Terrell Rhye and Roger Lambert for the starting nod.

Defensively the Blue Devils will be using a new system in an attempt to bolster what were problem areas last season.

Starting at defensive tackle will be Joe McIntire and Walter Leazer or Daniel Manriquez. Defensive ends will be Tony Hager and Johnny Walker. Bill Harvell, Brian Duckworth and Cress Alexander will fill the linebacking positions while Donald Duff and Leroy Chambers will open at cornerbacks. Defensive safety posts will be filled by Roger Lambert and Keye Everhardt.

Coach Karriker reports that the Blue Devil running game looks sound and that the team has worked hard to keep a potent passing attack that aided the offense last season.

"Our blocking has looked good in the line but we are going to have to improve our downfield blocking to be effective," Karriker remarked.

"We have been pleased with the play at the quarterback position but this is one spot where the players must prove themselves under fire," the coach said.

Coach Karriker is optimistic about his defensive unit. "We should be strong at defensive end and linebacker and our secondary has looked good in practice," the coach said, "however we will be starting four capable sophomores who will have to prove their ability under fire."

Roger Lambert or Bobby Craig will handle the punting assignments for the Blue Devils and David Mullis will kick off and kick extra points.
