Alcohol - Drug Information

Everyone feels depressed at one time or another. Usually there is a reason we feel that way. When we feel depressed the most natural thing is to just want to feel better.

One way people choose to feel better is to take a stimulant drug. Another way to deal with a depressed mood is to deaden the source of the depressed feeling.

Some use a drug. Depressant drugs reduce the activity of the brain, heart, and breathing, thus giving temporary relief to the drug user.

Depressant drugs include sedatives, barbiturates, and tranquilizers. An example of a sedative is Methaqualone (Quaalude). Barbiturates include the drug ending with -barbital. The most common tranquilizers in the United States include valium and librium.

Depressants are used medically for the treatment of high blood pressure, epilepsy, and insomnia, the inability to sleep. They are also used as a relaxant before and during surgery. Sometimes depressant drugs are used for both physical and mental illness. Like other drugs, depressants may be swallowed, injected, or smoked.

What To Do About Worst Traffic Hangup?

In the battle against one of its most annoying traffic headaches, Mooreville has one weapon left to use, but the town's commissioners hope it will not be necessary.

At last week's town board meeting, commissioners once again discussed the problems and potential for disaster created when tractor trailers try unsuccessfully to cross the railroad between Broad Street and Main Street.

The problems occur when trailers pulled by the trucks dig into the built-up road and railway bed. In most cases, trailers — most notoriously low-slung car carriers — become pivoted on the tracks and special tow trucks have to be called from Statesville or Charlotte.

Each time a trailer gets stuck, it takes between 30 minutes and several hours to remove the trailer and clear the intersection. This causes traffic congestion ranging from moderate to tremendous depending on the time of day, and creates an explosive worst-case scenario like that outlined by Commissioner Richard Nantz.

"What's going to happen one day if a train happens to be coming through at the same time a trailer gets stuck? It's going to be a mess," Nantz said at last week's meeting. Nantz, who along with fellow commissioners Gene Brannon and Darrell Wilson make up the town's traffic committee, said law enforcement authorities contact the railroad company as soon as possible when a trailer gets stuck, but he added that some day that might not be soon enough.

"It's going to happen sooner or later," Nantz said.

The commissioners talked about ways to eliminate the problem and briefly discussed creating a fine to levy on truck drivers who get their trailers caught on the tracks, but they opted to put off the adoption of a fine.

"A fine really wouldn't prevent the problem," Commissioner Bob Nantz said, "and that's what we're trying to do."

One step the commissioners agreed to was the placement of signs warning truck drivers that trailers could get caught on the tracks. One sign is already in place near Moor

Park. That sign advises truck drivers on South Broad Street to cross at Brawley Avenue instead of going to the end of Broad Street and attempting to cross at Doster Avenue.

Wilson, who operates Wilson's Auto Parts at the end of South Broad Street, said the crossing at the end of Broad Street is the toughest one for trailers to clear.

"I've had to go out there and flag a few down before they tried to cross," Wilson said, "but some try it and most don't make it."

He added that many times a truck driver will stop and take a good look at the crossing before trying to make it across.

"They get down there to the end of the street where it's a chore to try to turn the rig around," Wilson said. "They'd rather see if they can make it."
