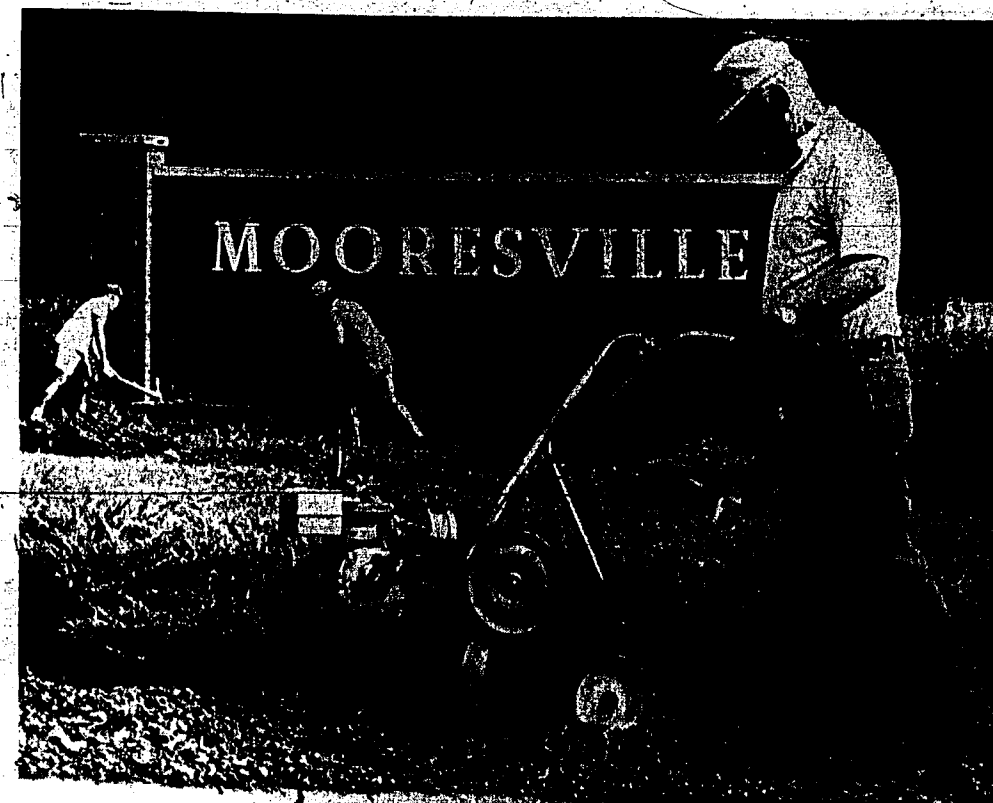

Unemployment Rates Show Slight Decrease

In June, unemployment rates showed a slight decrease in 70 of the state's 100 counties and in four of the nine metropolitan statistical areas. Employment Security Commission of North Carolina figures today show that only three counties experienced July unemployment rates over 10 percent. They were Tyrrell, 15.5 percent, from 15.8 percent; Graham with 15.0 percent, from 17.1 percent in June; and Wilson, 10.7 percent, from 10.8 percent.

In July MSAs were: Asheville, 4.7 percent, from 4.6 percent in June; Burlington, 4.7 percent, from 3.9 percent; Charlotte/Gastonia, 3.4 percent, from 3.3 percent; N.C./Rock Hill, S.C. 4.0 percent, from 4.1 percent; Fayetteville, 5.7 percent, from 6.5 percent; Greensboro/Winston-Salem/High Point, 4.3 percent, from 4.3 percent; Hickory, 3.9 percent, from 3.8 percent; Jacksonville, 3.7 percent, from 3.9 percent; Raleigh/Durham, 3.4 percent, from 3.5 percent and Wilmington, 6.4 percent, from 6.6 percent.

The state's seasonally unadjusted rate of unemployment decreased to 4.7 percent from 4.9 percent. The July figures also show the state's labor force at 3,389,500 with 3,229,300 employed and 160,200 unemployed.

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Feeder Calf Sales In Oct. At Fairgrounds

Two feeder calf sales are scheduled to be held at the Iredell County Fairgrounds in October, according to Michael P. Miller, an Iredell County agricultural extension agent.

The Oct. 7 sale is for Angus and Angus-Heredford crosses, while the Oct. 14 sale is for All Beef Breeds.

The calves must be delivered the day before the sale between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. Consignment forms have been mailed to past consignors. However, new consignors can pick up consignment forms at the office of the Iredell County Agricultural Extension Service in Statesville.

Rules are fairly simple—Feeder calves must be under one year of age with only steers and guaranteed calves being accepted. Calves must be without horns and properly healed from dehorning or castration.

In addition, they must be vaccinated against blackleg and malignant edema more than two weeks before the sale. They must weigh at least 300 pounds.

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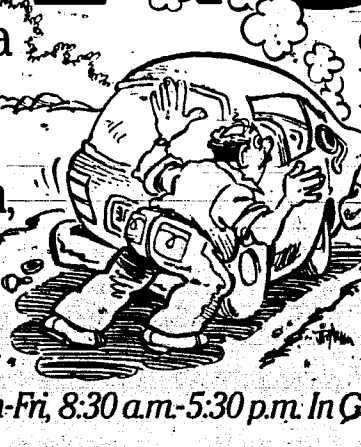
