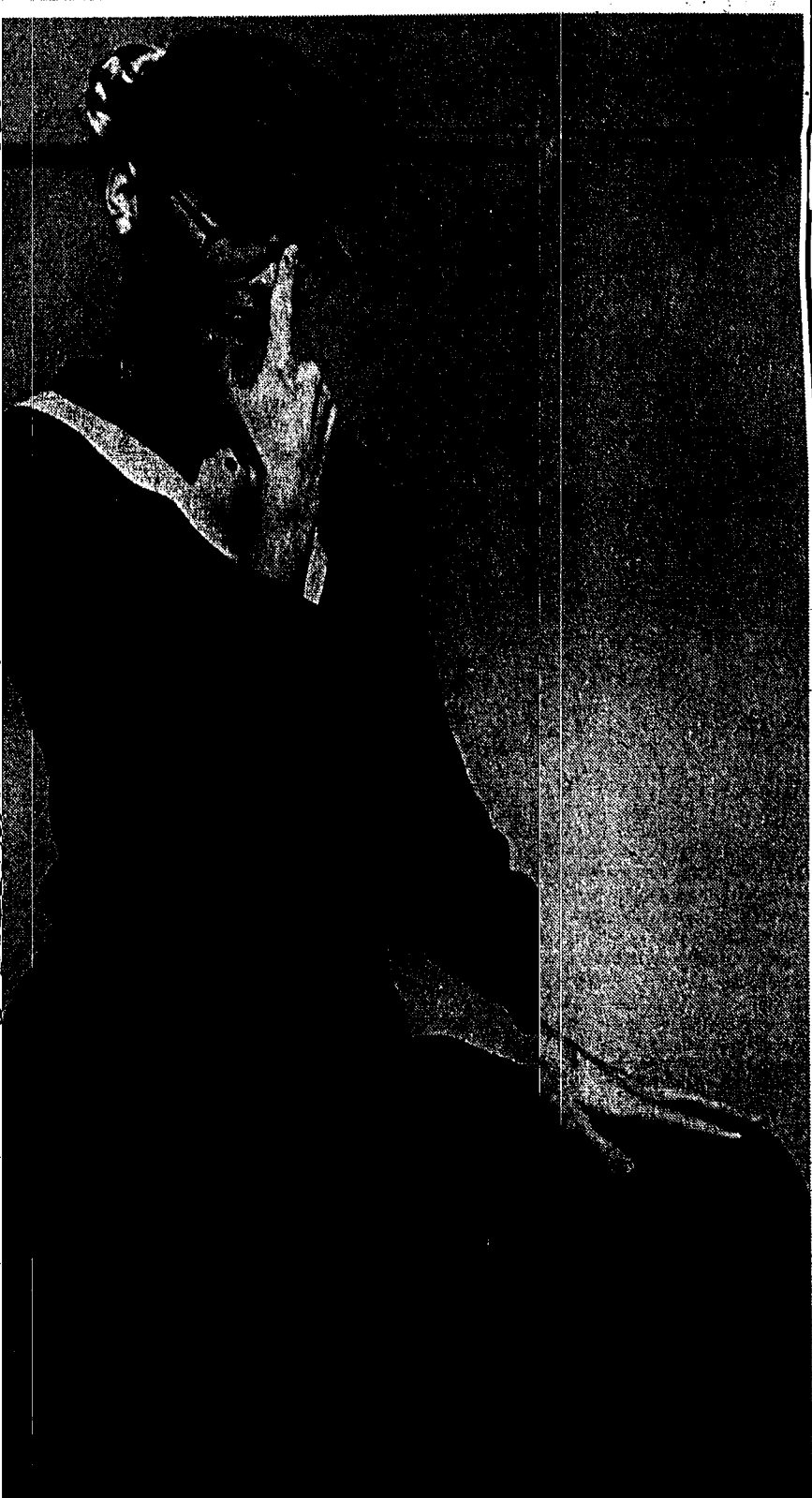

Mooreville's UDC Chapter Has 14 Members In Real Granddaughters Club

The Battle of Bentonville Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy met for its first meeting of the Fall season at the Boardwalk Restaurant on Sept. 1. After a luncheon, Mrs. Eugene Westmoreland, president, convened the meeting with a poem by Edgar A. Guest entitled "Teamwork."

As part of the business, discussion continued on a proposed clinic concerning genealogical research. It is hoped that this clinic can take place in late October or early November. After a clinician is secured and a place for the meeting arranged, details will be announced to the public. There seems to be considerable interest in this subject.

It was announced that 14 members are enrolled in the Real Granddaughters Club.

The North Carolina Division Convention will be held in Goldsboro, Oct. 7-10. Those who will represent the Battle of Bentonville Chapter are Mrs. Eugene Westmoreland, president, Mrs. Earl Hunsberger, secretary, and Miss Ruth Brown, treasurer.

Mrs. Richard Givens, vice president, presented an interesting program entitled "A Confederate

Pioneer in Texas." Fort Worth has a population of over 400,000. It was a frontier town after the War Between the States with a population of 250. General William Jenkins Worth had directed that a fort be placed west of Dallas. He died from cholera, never knowing that the fort would bear his name in perpetuity. Following the war, during the period of the carpet-baggers, the only government was martial law, and the Union general, Phil Sheridan, the State's military commander, said he'd rather live in hell.

K. M. Van Zandt was of a family which came to America before the Revolution. His father, Isaac, was an outstanding citizen and regarded as a contender for the governorship of Texas when he died of yellow fever in 1847, but Van Zandt went on to higher education and was admitted to the Bar in 1858 and enrolled in 1861 as a lieutenant in the Confederate Army. He became a prisoner of war, saw action at Chancellorsville and Missionary Ridge, and suffered severe lung problems.

After Lee's surrender, when the dream of the Confederacy faded, Major Van Zandt journeyed west from East Texas with the hope of a better life. The men with him dropped out one by one along the way as the distances between villages increased. But after 180 miles he arrived at Ft. Worth. Gloom abounded, but, in speaking with residents he felt there was a possibility of a renewal. Van Zandt bought a block in the city and envisioned the "City of the West."

In 1872, Buckley B. Paddock arrived in Ft. Worth. He, too, had served with distinction in the Confederate Army and with Van Zandt's help started a newspaper which was badly needed. He became the editor of the Fort Worth Democrat and in so doing became the self-appointed critic, conscience, voice, defender, and No. 1 salesman for the town. He campaigned for fire-fighters and equipment, public transportation and other causes. The carpet baggers were voted out and Major Van Zandt became Ft. Worth's voice in the House of Representatives.

Other famous and visionary confederates came to this frontier town realizing the possibility of the area. Their brand is stamped indelibly on this town, which is a gate-way to the West, with a population of almost a half million.

Plans for the annual fall district tour of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution of North Carolina have been completed by State Regent Mrs. Joseph K. Showley of Hickory and State Vice Regent Mrs. Joe M. Dietzel of Lumberton.

The tour will begin Monday, September 14, at Lake Junaluska, and will end Thursday, September 24, at Wadesboro.

North Carolina is made up of 110 DAR Chapters in nine districts which will be visited by all state officers and state chairmen who will discuss the year's work; give out specific instructions, and distribute packets of materials to all Chapter Regents.

Individual chapters will be hostesses for the meetings which will begin with registration at 9:30 a.m. followed by business session at 10 and lunch at 1 p.m. All chapter regents, chapter officers, chairmen and members are encouraged to attend.

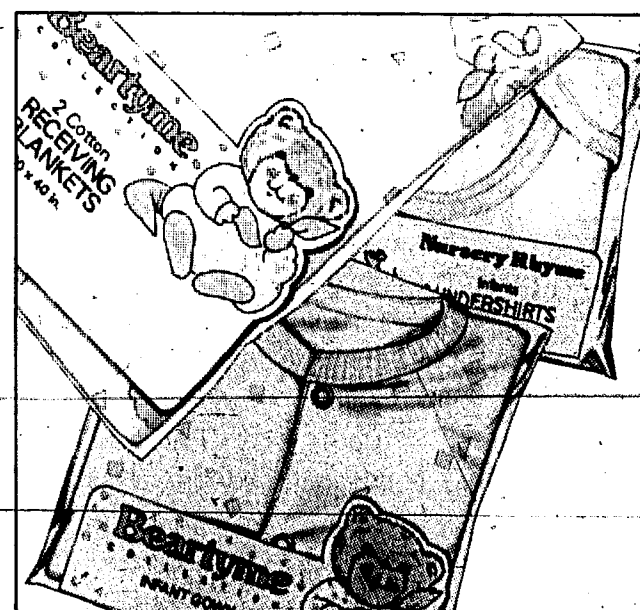
