

Soil Tests Needed For Feed Crops

Forage crops are produced on thousands of acres in North Carolina each year. Production of high yielding forages is an essential part of any successful livestock operation. To promote high yielding and good quality forages, Richard Rhodes, agronomist with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, stresses the importance of soil testing.

Soil testing provides a means by which farmers can identify and correct soil fertility problems prior to planting. This is especially important for the perennial forages such as alfalfa, fescue and others which may be in production for several years.

If lime or phosphorus is needed and is not applied and thoroughly incorporated prior to seeding, forage quality and yield can suffer. Even when these materials are top dressed later.

This limited response to surface applications of lime and phosphorus is due to the fact that there is very little downward movement of these materials into the root zone on most soils. Rhodes said that even though surface applications of lime and phosphorus are less effective, they should still be made when called for by soil testing. Neglecting to do so can result in a greater reduction of yield and quality.

Dove Hunters Beware Of Phone Lines

Dove season opened Saturday and, at the same time, an annual concern arose for officials at Alltel Carolina. This year, Alltel is asking area hunters for help in keeping service lines in good working condition.

"Our problem is a lot of hunters like to shoot at birds that are sitting on telephone lines," John Neill, Alltel vice president of operations for the Mooreville area, said. "Whether they hit the bird or not, they usually hit our lines and that can disrupt service for a great number of customers."

"We have a lot of people in remote areas who are heavily dependent on telephone service for medical emergency services," Neill added. "When one of our lines is damaged, it can put those people in a bad position."

"We would just ask that the hunters think twice before shooting at birds near any telephone equipment," Neill said.

Variety Of Fall Classes Offered At MCC's Center

A wide variety of subjects will be covered during classes at Mitchell Community College's Mooreville Extension Center this fall.

Registration is open now for the fall classes at the center, 219 North Academy Street, and for more information about the classes, visitors should contact the center at 663-1823. The class schedule includes the following:

Typing is an introduction to the touch-typing. Instruction will emphasize correct typing techniques, mastery of the keyboard, simple business correspondence, tabulation and manuscript.

The course will be held on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. starting Sept. 15 and ending Oct. 22. The registration fee is \$15 and the book cost \$12.

Elizabeth Lowder will be the course instructor.

The Notary Public course is designed for anyone interested in becoming a notary public in the state of North Carolina. The student must be 18 years old or older, registered to vote in the state and possess a high school diploma or equivalent. The person must satisfactorily complete a course of study approved by the secretary of state and purchase an approved manual that describes the duties, authority and ethical responsibilities of notaries public.

The class will meet Oct. 5 and Oct. 8 from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. Registration

for the class is \$15 and the manual cost \$8. The registration fee will be collected at the first class meeting. Lillian Laws will be the instructor.

The Knitting classes are designed to increase the student's knowledge of stitches and procedures used in hand knitting. Abbreviations, symbols, terms and types of yard will be discussed.

Knitting courses will start Sept. 16 from 9 a.m. to noon or Sept. 21 from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

The registration fee for the class is \$25 with a class minimum of 15 students. Students 65 or older do not have to pay the fee. Elaine McArn and Margie Smith of the Needlecraft Center in Davidson will be the course instructors.

The Job Search class is designed to meet the needs of people who are interested in joining the workforce for the first time, those who are returning after a number of years and those who are seeking a more challenging employment opportunity.

Topics will include self-appraisal, sources of job information, completing an education, preparing a letter of application, interviewing skills and — complements of area retailers — how to achieve a professional appearance on any size budget.

The class will start Sept. 14 and end Oct. 8. The course will meet on Monday and Wednesdays from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m.

The registration fee for the class will be \$20 with a minimum of 15 students and a fee waiver for people 65 years old or older. Mary Lew Barker will be the instructor.

Flower Arranging class is the study and practice of art form and principles of flower arranging. The class will include the use of flowers, containers, accessories and arrangement for special occasions.

Each student is expected to purchase their supplies.

The class will start Sept. 15 and end Nov. 17. The class will meet on Tuesdays from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. The registration fee is \$25 with the 15-student minimum and age fee waiver.

Small Business Management and Records is designed to introduce students to the world of small business and acquaint them with the fundamentals of effective business

management and record keeping. Some topics to be covered include: planning, organization, controlling, advertising, pricing, selling, credit, record keeping, budgeting, purchasing and insurance.

The class will start Sept. 17 and end Nov. 19. The class will meet on Thursdays from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. The registration fee is \$15 with a 15-student minimum and fee waiver for older students. Margaret Kivett will be the instructor.

Drawing and painting will give students an introduction to artistic endeavors in drawing and painting. The class will begin Sept. 15 and end Nov. 18. It will meet on Wednesdays from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m.

Introduction to Microcomputers is designed to give the student as much "hands-on" experience as possible.

The Music Doesn't Have To Stop
