Norwegian AFS Student Claims Miss Niblock As Bride In Concord

Officiating at the 5:00 p.m. candlelight service was Dr. James Braswell Holderness.

Musicians were Mrs. Mitzi Malone, organist, and Mrs. Betty Honeycutt Williams, soloist. Selections included "Alleluia From Exultate Jubilate," "I Love Thee" and "O Lord, Most Holy."

The bride is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Franklin Chalmers Niblock Jr. of Concord. She graduated from Concord High School and Salem College in Winston-Salem. Following her graduation, she has been employed by Niblock Development Corp. of Concord.

The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bjorn Eide of Narvik, Norway. He graduated from high school in Narvik and the University of Oslo School of Law in Oslo, Norway. Mr. Eide was an American Field Service exchange student in Mooresville during the 1978-79 school year, living with the Wade Carrigan family in Mooresville.

The young couple will spend three months in Japan where Mr. Eide has received a grant from the Japan-Scandinavian Sasakawa Foundation to research and prepare a handbook on the legal aspects of Norwegian firms seeking to do business in Japan.

The bride was escorted and given

in marriage by her father. She wore a long, ivory tulle gown. The bodice was fashioned with chantilly lace inserts from the high neck to the basque waist. The three-quarter length sleeves were made entirely of chantilly lace. Alencon lace, seed pearls and iridescent accents the front and back bodice. To complete the bridal look, a large bustle that included a tulle rosette and a folded sweep was featured at the center back waist and hip line. The entire skirt, including the chapel-length train was trimmed with Alencon lace. A fingertip length veil of silk illusion, set on a floral side to side headband and trimmed with seed pearls completed her ensemble.

She carried a cascade of ivory roses, stephanotis and fern, entwined with a spray of orange blossoms carried in 1879 by the bride's paternal great-grandmother, Mrs. Ellen Fisher Caldwell, and traditionally used by brides in the family.

Her gown was tea length, raspberry silk tulle and featured cap sleeves and a deep V back. The asymmetrical shirred dropped waistline swept up toward one shoulder and was accented by a rosette. She carried a bouquet of rubrum lilies and roses.

The ceremony was performed by the Reverend Dale Holcombe in the midst of a beautiful setting of a fifteen-lit candelabra centered by an arrangement of white gladioli, hot pink gerbera daisies, lilies, light pink statice and rubrum lilies. Spiral candelabras were on either side of the altar and the unity candle was the focal point with the mothers of the couple lighting two of the candles prior to being seated and the bride couple lighting the center candle to signify oneness of each other and their families. Fewer special guests were marked with fern and azalea blossoms nestled in illusion.

Gary Miller, organist, presented the following prelude selections: "Voluntary, Adagio, Ave Maria, Allegro Vivace, My Heart Ever Faithful, Allegro Risoluto, Bourée, All Creatures of Our God and King, Joy of Man's Desiring, and Quasi, We Do All Adore Thee."

Vocal selections were presented by three soloists, Rick Holler, brother-in-law of the bridegroom, presented "One Hand, One Heart," Dresia Sherrill sang "The Wedding Prayer" and Elizabeth Barnhardt rendered "Evergreen and Nobility Me Like You Do."

The procession for the attendants was Theme from Ice Castles and the bride entered to Bridal Chorus. For the postlude, Psalm XIX was played.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Lee Bass of Route 3, Statesville. She is a graduate of West Iredell High School and the University of North Carolina at Greensboro where she received a BS degree in dance education. She is employed by the Academy of Dance Arts in Mooresville and Statesville. She was crowned 1986-87 North Carolina Rhododendron Queen.

The bridegroom, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Richard Stutts of Route 4, Mooresville, is a graduate of South Iredell High School. He is employed by Duke Power Company at McGuire Nuclear Station.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was a vision of loveliness in an elegant gown of white satin designed with a Sabrina neckline and long lace appliqued sleeves. The basque waistline bodice had an overlay of alencon lace embellished with seed pearls and crystal beads. The full skirt extended into a cathedral train that was enhanced with diamond shaped lace appliques and rows of alencon lace. A wide border of alencon lace accented the hemline of the gown.

Her waltz length veil of illusion was secured to a crown of seed pearls, organza petals and crystal beads. The back of the veil was accented with three puffs of illusion.

The bride carried an alluring hand tied bouquet of calla lilies, spray of orchids, and star flowers surrounded with illusion and tied with white satin bow and streamers—giving a cascading effect with the illusion. Her only ornaments were diamond and pearl earrings, a gift of the groom.

The eight-tiered wedding cake was assembled on an 8-foot table and was the centerpiece of the bridal tables.

The bottom tier of the four-tiered center section was separated with twelve inch columns that enclosed a water fountain and fresh pink flowers and fern, resembling a garden. Above the fountain was the three remaining tiers. From the back side of the third tier stairways led to the other four tiers that stood on columns. The entire cake was iced in white and decorated with pink roses, accented with small doves.

Precious Moments' bridal figures adorned the top tier of the cake and the four extra side cakes. The adjoining stairways on the back sides of the cakes were tied in pink and adorned with daisies.

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
