School Board Declines RTI Study Invite

Thanks, but no thanks.

That, simply put, was the Mooresville Board of Education's unanimous decision during its regular monthly meeting Monday night concerning its invitation to take part in a trip designed to provide information about a model school concept in Iredell County.

The Mooresville board, along with the Statesville Board of Education, the Iredell County Board of Education, and the Iredell County Board of Commissioners were all invited by Larry Hedrick, chairman of the county board of commissioners, to participate in the study at the Research Triangle Institute.

The purpose of the study would be to allow representatives from each of the county's school systems to hear and see a model school proposal connected to plans concerning the possible consolidating of the three.

The commissioners, county board of education, and Statesville Board of Education have agreed to each accept the invitation.

But local board members, acting on a recommendation by Dr. Sam Houston, school superintendent, agreed to again strengthen their position as being totally uninterested in a county-wide merger by declining the invitation to take part in the trip.

"We don't need to go somewhere else to find out what a model school system is," said Houston, "because we feel we have one right here. Most, if not all, of the characteristics of a model school system are already here. We appreciate being invited to take part, but we see no advantages for us to be included in such a study at this time."

The Mooresville board has stressed numerous times that merging of the county's schools systems would not prove beneficial to the local system, and Monday night's decision firmly reiterated that point.

The board also again went on record as saying it would not favor a regional reorganization of the county's educational program, which would reduce the number of systems from three to two by creating separate northern and southern systems.

Houston, who estimated that such an RTI study would cost anywhere between \$40,000 and \$60,000, also expressed some concern over the fact that those concerned with education in Iredell County would listen to proposals from "some unknowns" rather than attempt to discuss the issue on their own.

"It seems to me that educational experts in Iredell County," offered Houston, "not RTI, should know more what's in our best interest."

While the decision concerning the RTI invitation dominated the meeting, the board also took care of additional business Monday night.

Houston informed board members of the presentation at the North Carolina School Boards Association's 18th annual conference Nov. 12 in Charlotte. Dr. Jane Carrigan, an officer of the Charlotte-Sheridan Fire Department, was the speaker.

management and use of the utility lines.

The grant guidelines that have not been met concern the creation of jobs for low and middle-income residents. Three projects listed in the grant outline—a motel, an automobile dealership and a truck stop—are in the very early stages of construction, which means no jobs have been created yet.

The deadline for meeting the original grant requirements has already passed, but an 18-month extension has been awarded. When the grant requirements are met, the state will no longer be involved in the project, which means the county will then be at liberty to turn the management of the lines over to Mooresville.

Until then, Mooresville and the county have to have a policy for the use of the lines, and they need to establish the policy soon, according to members of the board. Two businesses that participated in the funding of the project, Port City Exxon and the Shell service station, are ready to tap into the new lines and the Port Village Shopping Center, on the west side of the interstate, is only a few months away from completion.

To further complicate matters, the state has informed the county that it expects a percentage of the acreage fees collected until the grant specifications are met.

"We don't own the lines so we don't have the authority to make rules and allow someone to tap the lines," Town Manager Rick McLean explained. "We are planning to work with the county to tap into the lines that meet the county's and the state's requirements so we'll know everything is coordinated properly."

At Monday's meeting, Randall said the committee plans to meet with county officials and come up with a working policy within the next two weeks.

Ward I, Senior High School; Ward II, National Guard Armory; Ward III, Park View School; and Ward IV, the multi-purpose building at the Mooresville Golf Course.

School district polling places were the same as the town's, with the respective wards extending into the surrounding rural areas that are a part of the school district.

Residents of Barringer Township, who are in the Mooresville School District, cast votes at Park View School. Local school district residents in Davidson Township voted at the armory.

Questions & Answers

Q. I am 65 years old. I have already earned almost \$8,160 this year at my part time job, but I have taken home less after taxes and other deductions. Under Social Security, am I allowed to earn \$8,160 gross or \$8,160 take home pay?

A. In 1987, Social Security beneficiaries 65 through 69 may earn gross pay of \$8,160 without losing any benefits. Beneficiaries under 65 may earn gross pay of \$6,000. For any earnings above these amounts, \$1 of Social Security benefits will be withheld for each \$2 earned.

Q. My youngest daughter has Medicare coverage because she has permanent kidney failure. I plan to donate one of my kidneys to her for a kidney transplant operation. I know Medicare will pay for most of her hospital costs except for the hospital insurance deductible and coinsurance. Will Medicare also pay for the hospital cost I'll incur when I donate my kidney?

A. Hospital insurance pays the full cost of care for a person who donates a kidney for a Medicare patient's surgery. Additionally, donors do not have to pay any hospital insurance deductible or coinsurance charges.
