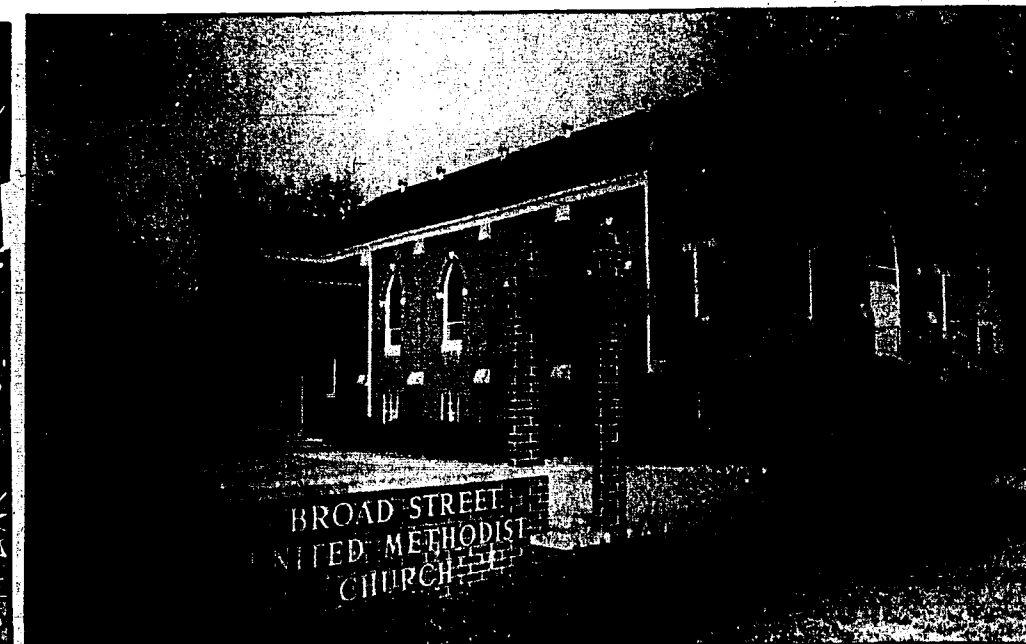

Broad Street Methodist Church Organized In 1919

Music And Scripture To Highlight December 20 Tour Of Churches

The public is invited and encouraged to take part in a Tour of Churches on Sunday, December 20, from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. This tour, sponsored by the Mooresville Branch of the American Association of University Women, includes the following churches: Broad Street United Methodist, Coddle Creek ARP, Central United Methodist, Mooresville ARP, St. Mark's Lutheran, and Fieldstone Presbyterian. At each church a brief devotion through music and the scriptures will be presented.

The tour will conclude at the Depot Garden on Main Street where a brass ensemble, under the direction of Bruce Boyles, will present Christmas carols with Debbie Sato as soloist and all those taking part in the tour singing. Refreshments will be served inside the Depot Art Center.

To highlight the garden area, members of the Industrial class at Mooresville Junior High School have created unpunished luminarias. At each church, if anyone chooses to do so, there will be a basket in the vestibule of each church for free will offerings. The money will be divided between the Christian Mission and Mooresville's Soup Kitchen.

During the conference year of 1919, several members who were members of Central Methodist Church felt the need for a church in Mooresville. Mr. J. H. Pink, a local businessman, was the first to apply to the quarterly Methodist Conference and at the next annual conference an application was made. The Conference assembled in Salisbury in October of 1920. Bishop U.V.V. Darlington appointed to this new charge Rev. J. Henry Capps.

At this time there was no building in which Broad Street congregation could worship. The charter members, numbering more than 75, soon secured a lot at the corner of South Broad and West Wilson Avenue. It was at this location that the Tabernacle was built. The first Sunday School was started with 58 members and the entire membership numbered 108. During Rev. Capps' appointments \$3,797 was raised for building purposes.

In 1921, Rev. G.W. Pink was appointed to the Mooresville charge. He was a very evangelistic minister. There were 3 or 4 revivals each year and as a result of his labor, there was a large increase in membership. During this growth two new wings were added to the Tabernacle. Rev. A.C. Kennedy came in 1925 and under his leadership a new church was started. During this time Rev. Kennedy received into the church 87 members and raised \$11,934, of which \$2,000 was used in building and equipment. Property at this time was valued at \$6,000.

The years of 1928 through 1933 were under the pastorate of Rev. T.W. Hager. He accepted a deep challenge as he found a very depressed congregation. The old Tabernacle had become unsatisfactory for worship and the building was far from being in any condition to use. The mills were not running very well and many of the substantial supporters had moved for other jobs. Rev. Hager picked up his tools with the spirit of the Divine upon him and soon others took up the new courage. People began to see the possibility of completing the new church. The congregation worshipped in the new building for the first time on Easter Sunday of 1939.

During this time, Rev. Hager encouraged the members to begin construction on a new parsonage. In 1932, the construction began on the new parsonage.

Rev. Hager was asked to serve the charge for a fifth year. In the five-year appointment, \$19,043 was raised and \$8,851 was used for building and equipment. Property was valued at \$20,000 and the church had a debt of \$4,000.

Rev. J.E. McSwain came in 1933 and he seemed to know what the congregation needed. His sermons were most encouraging. Due to prolonged depression, the congregation was unable to carry its financial obligations. Realizing the circumstances, Rev. McSwain made application to the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Church to secure a loan to pay off the indebtedness with the building loan and an unsecured debt. The first application was rejected. The loan was secured after good friends who furnished the building materials for construction of the church agreed to settle for fifty percent of the amount owed. While Rev. McSwain was at Broad Street, he led the members in constructing a basement under the church for the use of Boy Scouts. In September of 1945, this addition became the Men's Bible Class. Seventy-four were received into the church. During this appointment, \$7,557 was raised and \$2,653 of this was used in building and paying debts.

Rev. Seymour Taylor was appointed in 1955 to serve Broad Street and Jones Memorial with Rev. H.C. Brackett as junior pastor. Rev. Taylor was called to his eternal reward about a month after coming here. After his death, other ministers provided services and Jones Memorial became a separate charge with Rev. Brackett, as the pastor.

A young, christian man by the name of Wilson Nease, came as an experienced preacher. During his one year stay, a great deal of good was accomplished with the young people of the church. Rev. Nease received fifty-five members into the church and raised \$3,000. In 1957, he was called to the church.

Serving from 1958 until 1959 was Rev. J.P. Hornbuckle. The building program had been completed but the debt still remained. It was his hope that the debt be paid during his time and in his second year, his wish was fulfilled in an unexpected way. The debt was paid as a result of a tragedy. It was Sunday morning, Jan. 30, 1959 when Sunday School members were in the sanctuary for devotionals that a fire originated in one of the Sunday School rooms. Through the settlement with the insurance company, the debt was paid and by using the money wisely, the men repaired the damage. In 1959, Rev. Hornbuckle led the entire district in accessions to the church and on Easter Sunday, he had a class of about 40 children to unite with the church. During this year, Rev. Hornbuckle held the first Bible School. One hundred and six members were received into the church and \$5,890 was raised.

Rev. V.R. Masters was appointed to Broad Street in 1959. During his service, many revivals were held and the spiritual state of the church members was very good as witnessed by the attendance at Sunday School and at worship services. The church was in its best financial condition ever.

Appointed to the church in 1943 was Rev. W.H. Benfield. He came well with the young people and Wednesday evening prayer services had an attendance of about 40. Due to infantile paralysis quarantine in 1944, there was no church school for children under 13 years of age. The youth division had a full summer of activities with two representatives from the senior group, Juanita Morris and Virginia Morris, going to Lake Junaluska. Attending the assembly were Margaret Setzer, Rachel Harwell, Betty Sinclair, Lucille Williams and Cecil Newton.

During the time of Rev. Claude J. Hartwell, 1977-1982, the educational building was dedicated. A new parsonage was purchased at 902 Hampton Place in 1981 with the Hartwell's living there for a short time before his re-appointment.

Rev. John S. Jordan came in 1983 and remained until 1985. A move was made to rent the old parsonage, rather than tear it down. The library was named Mary M. Earmhardt and a plaque was placed on the library door denoting the new name. A parking lot, complete with cement curbing and an outlet to Academy street, was completed along with a ramp from the parking lot to the church. These were paid for and completed by June 18, 1985. Also the church left floor was replaced in parlay wood and a wheelchair was purchased to be used for the new ramp.

Rev. Harold C. Austin came in 1985 and continues to serve the church.

During the war, the church people tried to keep in touch with the service men and a flag was placed in remembrance of each young man who served with the Armed Forces from the church at a special service. Each worship service closed with relatives of the service men gathered around the altar for prayers.

Iredell County's Chuck Carter To Attend 4-H Congress

Forty-three delegates from 25 North Carolina counties—including Iredell County's Chuck Carter and Tom Sullivan, will attend the 66th National 4-H Congress Dec. 5-10 in Chicago, Ill.

Carter, state winner in the 4-H Poultry Project, is the 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Carter of Statesville, route 1.

The North Carolina Poultry Federation is the donor for Carter's expense-paid trip to the national event.

A member of the Cool Springs 4-H Club, Carter has held local club offices of vice president and president and he has been vice president of Iredell's 4-H County Council, an office he will continue to fill during 1988.

He has been a county project winner for three years, a county demonstration winner for two years, a district demonstration winner one year, a district project winner two years and a state demonstration winner.

The Tar Heel delegates won the expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Congress as state winners in a 4-H program or activity. They will join 1,600 delegates representing 4-H clubs across the nation.

Each year, the National 4-H Council recognizes outstanding youth by providing educational scholarships. This year scholarships total \$200,000. Four-H members will be awarded national and regional scholarships ranging in value from \$500 to \$1,500 each.

The National 4-H Council coordinates annual 4-H Congress in cooperation with state Extension Services of land-grant institutions. About 60 corporations, foundations and other organizations provide more than \$1 million each year for trips, scholarships and other support.

The theme for this year's National 4-H Congress stresses 4-H involvement in guiding youth toward being self-directing, productive American citizens.

A special highlight of the program will be an address by Dr. Joyce Brothers, noted psychologist.
