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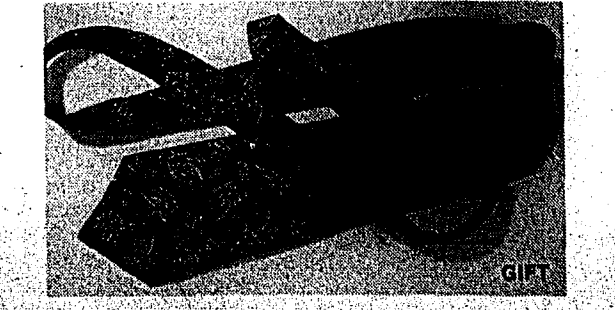

UDC Chapter Luncheon Fetes Gilladette Couple

The Battle of Bentonville Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy held its monthly meeting June 4, at the Western Steer Restaurant. Fourteen were present for the meeting and farewell luncheon for Mr. and Mrs. E.L. Gilladette, who are moving to Hermitage, TN. Mrs. Gilladette was presented a beautiful bouquet of roses and a piece of local pottery, along with a lovely card. Place were marked with individual cake squares decorated with a Confederate flag.

The Ritual was conducted by Mrs. Thele Gilladette. Mrs. John Redden's program theme was Confederate States of America. This was the name taken by six southern states when they organized their own government at Montgomery, AL. In February of 1861, the states seceded from the government of the United States in 1860 and 1861 because they feared that the election of Abraham Lincoln might lead to restrictions on their right to do as they chose about the question of slavery. The first state to leave the union was South Carolina on Dec. 20, 1860. Mississippi, Florida, Alabama, Georgia and Louisiana followed in January, 1861. In March, 1861, Texas seceded and later in that year Virginia, Arkansas, North Carolina and Tennessee joined the ranks.

The Confederacy suffered great financial disadvantage. The wealth of the nation before secession lay mostly in the North. The confederate government had issued paper money early in the war. This money soon became worthless.

Progress of the war favored the Confederacy in the first months. In 1863, the tide began to turn against the Confederacy. The North kept its army supplied ammunition, food and clothing while the army of the South often lacked these supplies.

The main Confederate Army, the army of Northern Virginia, surrendered on April 9, 1865. The people of the Confederacy had defended a way of living that to them seemed right. But they yielded to superior forces. The road to reunion in spirit between the North and South was long, but the beginning of the 1900's resentment had been largely forgotten.

Local Chapter activities during May included a visit to Veteran's Hospital in Salisbury to deliver gifts; attendance at memorial services at Willow Valley Cemetery and the unveiling of the monument to Rowan's Confederate soldiers in Salisbury.

A special called business meeting was held at the home of Mrs. Earl Huntsberger on May 20. The Chapter's summer project will be researching Willow Valley Cemetery, locating and cataloging graves of C.S.A. soldiers.

There will be no formal meetings in July and August. Regular meetings will resume in September.

Attending the bride as maid of honor was Rachel Helms and bridesmaids were Donna Wiles, Donna Williams, Maureen Comings and Rhonda Byrd.

All of the attendants wore the dress. The bride wore a mermaid style gown of amethyst satin. The bodice, with a sweetheart neckline and off-the-shoulder sleeves, was overlaid in lace. They chose matching shoes.

Flower girls were Carrie Alford and Jennifer Sipes. The groom's father was best man. Ushers were Danny Williams, Mark Stultz of Hickory, brother of the groom, Bennie Meeks of Kernersville and Bob Howell of Greensboro.

Ringbearer was Justin Sipes. A reception followed the ceremony in the church Fellowship Hall.
