

Miss Compton Becomes Bride Of Mr. Young In Afternoon Ceremony

At two o'clock in the afternoon on Saturday, June 1, Miss Ginger Liane Compton and Brian Lewis Young were united in marriage at Broad Street United Methodist Church of Mooresville. The impressive ceremony was performed by the pastors of the bride and groom, The Reverends Edwin H. Hedgpeth and Robert M. Richardson.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh R. (Buddy) Compton of 1105 South Magnolia Street, Mooresville. The groom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Michael L. Young of Route 10,

Mooresville. As guests arrived, they found the outside entrance handrails marked on the top and bottom area of the steps with white satin bows.

In the vestibule, Miss Courtney Cook, Miss Dana Arnold and Miss Kim White greeted the guests, invited them to register and presented wedding bulletins. The guest book was placed on a podium, along with the bride's throw-away bouquet.

The altar of the church sanctuary was ornamented beautifully with a fifteen-branch

arched candelabra, flanked by two spiral candelabras with each holding lighted cathedral tapers. Two tree candelabras graced the outer edges of the communion rail and also held matching tapers. Each was centered with fresh floral bouquets of white gladioli, pink carnations, hot pink miniature carnations, white cushion mums, purple statice, and Baker's fern. Large peace lilies and fan palms were interspersed among the candelabras.

The communion table was marked with the cross and lighted altar candles, along with an open Bible which the bride's mother carried in her wedding. A long stemmed white rose with pink ribbons was placed across the Bible in loving memory of the bride's grandmother Mrs. Almonta Probst.

The unity candles were used in the decorations and as the mothers of the bride couple were escorted to their pews, they continued to the altar and each lit the outside family candle. Prior to the benediction, the center candle was lighted by the couple, to signify oneness of each other and each family.

Pews for the honored guests were adorned with white satin bridal bows entwined with ivy while each window of the sanctuary was marked with a large hurricane globe over a white lighted candle surrounded by fresh magnolia foliage.

Wedding musicians were Mrs. Marla C. Young, organist/pianist and Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Young and Mrs. Debbie Brown, vocalists.

Prelude selections were: Humble Yourself in the Sight of the Lord, Hear O Lord, The Road Less Traveled, For the Beauty of the Earth, all by Howard and Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring, Bach Always by Rosasco were presented as duets and solos were Wedding Song, unknown, Through the Eyes of Love, Hamish and as a trio, Surely the Presence of the Lord, Wolfe.

The wedding hour was chimed

by the organist and bridal attendants processed to Trumpet Voluntary by Clarke. The bride made her entrance to Bridal Chours by Wagner.

During the ceremony, vocal selections were Only God Can Love You More by Liles, We Are One by Gersmehl and The Lord's Prayer by Malotte.

Given in marriage by her parents, the bride was beautiful in a close fitting gown of white satinsheer, fashioned with a V-neckline just below the knees and up to a point in the back at the upper hipline. This was completely covered in beaded and sequined appliques. The shoulders were covered in illusion extending to a very low V just beyond the waist in the back. A collar of beaded and sequined appliques formed a point on the front bodice while the large puffed sleeves were accented with appliques and a band covered in matching appliques coming to a point in front. A front ruffle and cathedral length train were centered with matching appliques while the train was completely outlined in the same matching beaded and sequined appliques. Completing the style of the gown and train was a large bow in the back.

The bride designed her gown and it was made by her mother. A beaded and sequined headpiece held her veil of shimmering silk illusion.

She carried a traditional fresh cascade of white and light pink bridal roses accented with pearl sprays, baby's breath, and pink and white pearl streamers, surrounding a white cymbidium orchid.

Grandparents of the bride couple, Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Compton, Mr. William Probst of Maiden, Mr. and Mrs. Lennie Caldwell and Mr. and Mrs. L.P. Young and great grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Hugh McNeely of Mt. Ulla were remembered with white miniature carnations and baby's breath corsages and boutonnieres.

All those assisting with the wedding and reception in anyway were remembered with white cushion mum corsages and boutonnieres.

The wedding was directed by Glenda Carraker and all church decorations and other flowers were provided by The Unicorn.

The reception was held in the church Fellowship Hall which was transformed into a beautiful garden setting. Guests entered by strolling under a white lattice archway flanked by lattice panels and stately palms.

The focal point of the bridal tables was the large wedding cake placed on an oblong rectangular table with four longer tables set up in a V-formation on each side of the main table. The cake, topped with a ceramic bride and groom figurine, was encircled with an iridescent half-circled arch of leaves, flowers and pearl sprays. A flowing fountain stood under the center part of the cake and two satellite cakes were placed on tall columns on either side of the center cake and joined by two center cakes with accents of fuchsia ribbons. The cake was decorated and surrounded by springer, pink alstroemeria, light and hot pink roses and miniature carnations, purple statice, baby's breath and fuchsia ribbon streamers. Two small nosegays

were placed under the columns of the two side cakes and completed the elegant beauty of the cake. Served with cake were meatballs, finger sandwiches, wedding cookies, chocolate squares, cheese flowerettes, mints, nuts and melon balls and strawberries in a carved watermelon basket. A refreshing punch with raspberry sherbet completed the foods.

The bridal tables were covered identically in white linen overlaid with white lace and caught up at the corners with large fuchsia bows.

White lattice panels, entwined with ivy, formed a backdrop for the food tables, along with lush large ferns on white wicker stands.

Assisting with the serving were Carol Plyler, Mary Probst, Rhonda Probst, and Michelle Greene, all of Maiden, Pat Young, Connie Sykes, Nancy Brody, Margaret Hendricks of South Carolina and Lynda Arnold.

Tables for the guests were covered in white linen and centered with candles and fresh magnolia foliage.

To complete the setting, each window of the reception area was adorned with lush ferns and pink illusion puffs extended over the curtain rods.




