

Gardner To Leave Davidson For Position At Whitman

Robert E. Gardner, dean of admissions and financial aid, at Davidson since July 1987, is resigning to accept the vice presidency of college relations at Whitman College.

He will leave Davidson July 22 and begin work at Whitman Aug. 1. His new position will include responsibility for admissions, financial aid, publications and institutional research. Whitman, located in Walla-Walla, Wash., is a liberal arts college with 1,250 students.

John Kuykendall, president of Davidson, said he is indebted to Gardner for presiding over four very successful years of admissions work at Davidson. He said that when peer institutions have had a tougher time enrolling top students.

Gardner's decision also comes just days after the admissions office moved into deluxe new quarters, the renovated Grey House at the corner of Main and Griffith streets in Davidson.

Kuykendall continued, "We regret that Rob will not be there to enjoy the new setting, but the opportunity at Whitman sounds like a marvelous challenge, and a well-deserved opportunity for him to use his gifts more broadly."

Kuykendall said Davidson will immediately begin a nationwide search to fill the vacated position, with hopes of finding someone during the coming academic year. In the interim, the job will be handled by an appointee to be named soon from the college staff.

Gardner graduated cum laude from Linfield College in Oregon in 1968. He came to Davidson from Cornell University, where he received his master's degree in intellectual history and his Ph.D. in the history of science. He worked in a variety of positions at many colleges across the country. Davidson had a record 2,223 applications for the 410 available spots in its Class of 1995.

Gardner said he was also proud of broadening the geographic makeup of the Davidson student body and helping recruit better academically qualified athletes and students with stronger artistic talents. He said he was proud of building a strong staff and of "putting a computer on everyone's desk."

He supervised development of a plan to fund student financial aid for the next decade and implemented a new gender policy for admissions. A new admissions videotape and new publications were produced during his tenure, and he put in place a new admissions marketing system.

He said substantial challenges await his successor. They include broadening the mix of students on campus in its drive to become a truly national institution, and implementing merit scholarships to help Davidson attract the very best students in an era when competition colleges lure many away with those scholarships.

"The biggest challenge on the horizon for all private, highly-selective liberal arts colleges, though, will be an increasing lack of public confidence. We need to demonstrate that this type of education is worth the cost," said Gardner. "There's a perception that colleges are raising their prices without justification, and that the diplomas they offer are no more valuable than one from a public institution in terms of a student's career. I'm convinced that they are, but we will have to do a better job in communicating that to the public."
