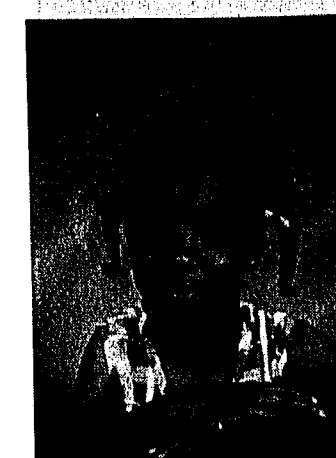

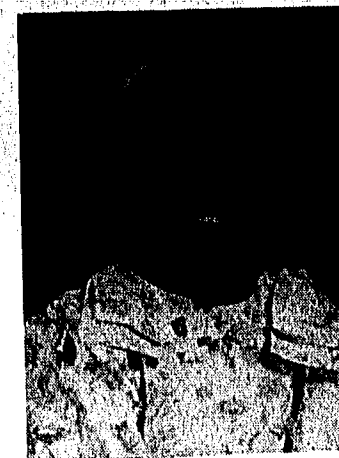
At this event, the groom chose to present gifts to his best man and ushers.

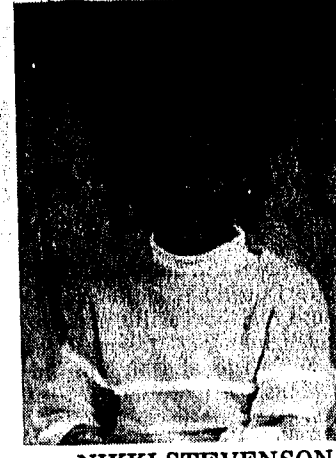
After a wedding trip to Charleston, SC, the newlyweds are residing on Triplett Road, Mooresville.

## "Waist Basket" Program Set By County Health Dept.

Do you need to lose weight? If so, you are not alone, because obesity is a major health problem in the United States. The Surgeon General's report states that obesity affects as many as 34 million adults. Obesity is a risk factor for coronary heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, diabetes, and possibly some types of cancer as well as other chronic diseases. Knowing this, it is important to want to lose those extra pounds.

The desire to lose weight is shared by the millions of people enrolled in some type of weight loss program. Nationally, consumers spend billions of dollars a

year trying to lose weight. "Unfortunately, many people who have tried various fad diets and gimmicks are unable to maintain their weight loss, because they have failed to change their eating habits and to make proper food choices," says Mary Beth Cox, Nutritionist with the Iredell County Health Department.

"Often group support is needed when making changes in dietary and exercise habits for losing weight," continues Cox. Therefore, the Iredell County Health Department's Health Promotion Program will sponsor a series of weight management
