Reid Memorial Church To Mark Anniversary

Reid Memorial Presbyterian Church will celebrate its 124th anniversary on May 5 starting with the 11 a.m. worship service.

—The Rev. Karen Pearson will be the guest speaker for the afternoon service which begins at 4 p.m. Pearson is currently the pastor at Freedom Presbyterian Church in Statesville and Allen Temple Presbyterian Church in Cleveland.

Pearson received her bachelor of science in special education from Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio and attended Johnson C. Smith University Seminary in Presbytery.

Within the presbytery, she serves on the permanent Judicial Committee, the Evangelism Committee, the Black Caucus and acts as advisor for the Committee on Women in the Ministry. She is a trustee of the William Black Lodge in Montreat and is an advisor for the Iredell Memorial Hospital Chaplaincy.

Reid Memorial is the oldest and the only Black Presbyterian church in Mooresville. The church was established in 1867.

According to "Mooreville Centennial, A Commemorative Booklet," after the Civil War, Northern or U.S.A. Presbyterians sent some missionaries to the South to start working with the Blacks. Naturally, the Blacks wanted to get out to themselves so they could shout their praises for having being set free from bondage. Reid Memorial Presbyterian Church was thus established. The first minister was white.

Ex-lavie owner Major Rufus Reid of Mt. Mourne gave the land on which Reid Memorial now stands. Major Reid died on July 15, 1864, owning an extensive estate and 80 slaves. According to the census of 1860, his third wife Isabella Torrance Reid, had an estate of 62 slaves, the largest in southern Iredell County. The major, his third wife and many descendants are buried in the Centre Presbyterian Church Cemetery.

The Rev. Billings of Statesville was the church's first minister. The next minister was the Rev. John G. Murray who stayed with the church for 35 years. He preached on Sundays and helped to teach blacks how to read and write during the week in the old Academy building of the church which once stood next to the present church.

Next came the Rev. Long, who stayed for two years. The late

Construction on the project has begun and Marion hopes to be operating in his new headquarters by September.

Roger, NASA, Mooresville Youth Undergoes Astronaut Training

Christina Stakely of Mooresville trained for a space adventure, explored the future of scientific exploration, and earned college credit at U.S. Space Academy Level II technology track in Huntsville, Ala.

Space Academy trainees in grades 10, 11 and 12 sample astronaut training by using Space Academy's special astronaut training simulators. They spin and twist in the multi-axis training simulator, an adaptation of early Mercury program training equipment.

Trainees also bounce high in the air while experiencing the microgravity training chair,

which is similar to equipment Apollo astronauts used in training for missions to the Moon. They also spin and turn in the five degrees of freedom trainer, which was used by Gemini astronauts preparing for early spacewalks.

Space Academy Level II trainees use the nation's only full-scale space shuttle exhibit to get a better understanding of the shuttle works. Then they use Space Academy's realistic mission control and space shuttle orbiter mockups for training, which leads to a 24-hour simulated space mission.

Trainees choose one of three mockups.

They also participate in a basic scuba diving class in the underwater astronaut trainer, a 120,000 gallon tank in the U.S. Space Camp Training Center. NASA astronauts train for spacewalks while floating in a giant tank of water. Engineering trainees are introduced to the same spacewalk training technique. Space Academy Level II trainees are housed throughout their eight-day training program in the Space Habitat, a futuristic dormitory built to simulate aspects of the Space Station.

They also enjoy the many hands-on activities and demonstrations at the U.S. Space and Rocket Center. And they learn the history of space exploration by touring the Space Center's rocket park, the most comprehensive collection of manned spacecraft rockets on Earth.

Heather Harrison of the Mazeppa 4-H Club was recently named the state winner with her 4-H cumulative records in Electric Energy, Junior Division.

Harris currently serves as president of the Mazeppa 4-H Club where she has been a member for six years. She has participated in 4-H Electric Energy program for three years.

Projects are judged based on scope and depth of experience, learning experiences, presentation, facts and exhibits, leadership experiences, citizenship, and community service.

Harris has assisted with teaching workshops for youth on lamp making, electric safety, and how electricity is produced.

The title of her 1990 presentation was "The Magic of Electricity." She represented Iredell County at the Southwest District Activity Day held in Lincoln.

Other projects she has participated in include peanut foods, dairy foods, personal appearance, and health.

Harris will receive an all expense paid trip to the 1991 N.C. State Electric Congress to be held in Charlotte.

Harris, a seventh grader at Troutman Middle School, is the daughter of James and Joan O. Harris of Mt. Ulla. Her grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Robert B. Ostwald of Mooresville and Mr. and Mrs. David A. Harris of Mt. Mourne.
