## Catching that fall fishing fever

Some of the best fishing of the year usually occurs during the fall season. The bass move back into the shallows chasing shad and crayfish, the strippers school up and begin to feed, and the crappie move back into shallow brush piles throughout the lake.

You can fish any kind of bait and enjoy success and the slow summer fishing seems to explode into wide-open fall action. This week we should see some great bass fishing, as well as some serious improvement in the stripper fishing. If you after the crappie, you might have to fish deep and slow for another week or two, but it won't be much longer before the fish come up.

The bass are working the shallow riprap banks all over the lake. You need to look for deeper banks with at least a foot of water on the rocks. You have the chance to catch a really big fish this month so take good care of your equipment.

The best way to approach each trip is to start out early in the morning with top water baits looking for active fish. Keep working the surface until you stop getting bites, then switch to a Texas rigged worm or a jig. Keep working the riprap until it gets hot and bright, once the sun is really bearing down, switch over to flipping picks. There are fish up on all the piers during the mid day hours.

Green colored worms and jig will work well, but try to use a little red too. The crayfish molt will make the fish more aggressive towards anything with a little red in it.

There are some nice schools of fish in both hot holes this week, but they are educated. You need to use light line and small baits to get any bites. There have also been lots of fish feeding under the lights along the main channel and you can catch them on crankbaits after dark. If you can't find anything that the fish seem to want, try using a floating worm.

The strippers are beginning to show up around the islands in the river. You can have fun; we'll see you out there!

## Bronco all-stars cover all the bases

Consider all the bases still being covered by Mooreville's Fall Bronco Baseball League all-stars.

The team remained undefeated for the season with two more wins last week, dodging a bullet from Huntersville II, 5-2, before punishing Davidson I, 20-3.

The wins jack the Bronco League crew's mark to the 4-0 mark entering this week's play.

In the closest of last week's two outcomes, the local entry used three runs scored in the first inning and single tallies each in the second and third to make the difference.

C.C. Poston was the

starting and winning pitcher.

At the plate, Chris Beaver paired hits and also drove home two, while Dominique Houston also picked up two hits. Andrew Yacek and Adam Tonaus slapped out single base hits each, while Tonaus and Billy Newton each played a run.

In the cruise past Davidson, Mooreville started with two runs in the first and scored three times in the second before unleashing with a nine-run third. It then put matters to rest with six more runs in the fourth.

Tonaus and Beaver each ignited the offense with

catch them from Long Island down to Marker 21. During the day, use live shad on down-lines and fish close to the bottom in deep water. In the early mornings and late evenings, try free-lining shad and casting top-water plugs over shallow flats.

You can still pick up a few fish down under Davidson Creek trolling lead-core line and buck tails, but the most consistent fishing will be upriver throughout this month. Jiggling spoons will work well if you can find a large school of strippers near the bottom. The trick to this time of year is to locate the right area. Use your depth finder and don't be afraid to spend a lot of time looking. The fish will roam around all day long and you might wait a long time for them to come to you.

If you aren't marking lots of bait and fish, you aren't going to have a lot of success. If you can't find any shad, you might be able to catch a few on shiners or trout as a last resort.

The crappie have started to move up, but they are still awfully deep. Live minnows are the way to go this week, unless you can find some fish in shallow brush piles towards the end of the week. Jigs will work well on the shallow fish, but you need to just let your bait hang there for the deeper bites. There are some nice crappie beneath the lights, but the white perch make fishing for them a real challenge.

You can't get your bait in the water without them mauling it. Use jigs at night, because you can't see enough minnows to get through the perch. Just start each trip out fishing in deep water and work your way up into the shallows until you hit the right depth. Once you catch a few fish, keep working areas in the same depth range and you should keep getting bites all day.

The fishing should be excellent this week. We have enjoyed a little rain and some cooler weather to drop the surface temperature of the lake a little. The falling temperatures will have the fish hungry and things should remain good all week long. Have fun; we'll see you out there!
