



All conference, Region soccer honorees

Talk about your A-team. That's precisely what this group of participants of Mooresville Senior High's varsity girls soccer team wound up being members of following their respective performances on the field this past spring season. They're the members of the Lady Devils who merited all-Western Foothills Athletic Conference and All-Region 12 accolades when those honors were released in late May. Receiving all-WFC status features, from left, Erin Andrews, Leah Duquette, Kendal Brawley, Abby Pardew, Katie Archer and Terry Shinn, the latter sharing league coach of the year recognition. Of the group, Brawley and Duquette also earned All-Region status, while Shinn doubled up as well as that area's Coach of the Year. Erica Johanson also received twin attention as an all-conference and All-Region selection. All of the honors comes after this year's team crafted a 12-7-1 overall record that included a 9-3 league slate, the latter worth a share of second and putting the Devilettes back in state post-season play for the first time since the 1993 season.

Delay not worth the wait as Moors dealt defeat at home

As it turned out for Mooresville's host American Legion baseball team Wednesday night, a half-hour weather delay before its final home non-conference game of the season wound up not being worth waiting for. Hosting Surry County on the Mooresville Senior High School diamond for a non-league, inter-division contest, the Moors were dealt a 6-3 defeat in a game played in seven innings due to a mutual agreement between the two teams.

With the loss, the Gresham-Baker Post 66 crew now takes an 8-7 overall record that includes a 4-2 Southern Division of Area III effort into later play this week that will open a crucial stretch of critical conference play. The Moors, at home for a second straight night, managed to take a 2-1 lead with a pair of runs in the bottom of the second inning, but managed just a single run from that point, it coming in the home half of the sixth. Surry County, making the trip to Mooresville after an earlier game between the two was canceled by rain, scored four runs in the fourth and added a final run in the sixth for the winning margin. The guests had scored first with a run in the top of the second.

At the plate, West Rowan product Justin Graham carried the home team's hottest bat, cracking out three hits including a triple, while Darrin Jones, also of West Rowan, added two base knocks. Mooresville Senior High's Ronald Crum collected the only other

base knock.

At the plate, it was a night of firsts as well for the team's hottest hitter all season, as South Iredell product Michael McClain was held hitless for the first time in 14 games, also striking out for just the first time all season.

In the pitching department, Ryan Smith of Mooresville started and took the loss, falling to 1-3 with four innings of work, allowing five runs on seven hits. Josh Haire, two innings, one run and three hits, and Brandon Neill, one, zero and one, respectively, each also of Mooresville, also shared some mound time. Because the game was a non-league affair, Mooresville filled the field with reserve players, giving them a chance to perform under true game conditions before entering the most important stage of the regular-season that has just three weeks remaining.

Post 66 gets down to the nitty gritty as of this (Friday) evening, playing a league game at Mooresville-Davie that opens a stretch of four games to be played within an as-many day span.

Mooresville hosts SD-Area III foe Stanly County Saturday, keeping intact a scheduling quirk that finds it at home every Saturday night of the season, and stays at home to entertain Kannapolis Sunday night. Monday, the Moors go on the road to complete the league series with Stanly County.

All games carry 7:15 p.m. starting times.

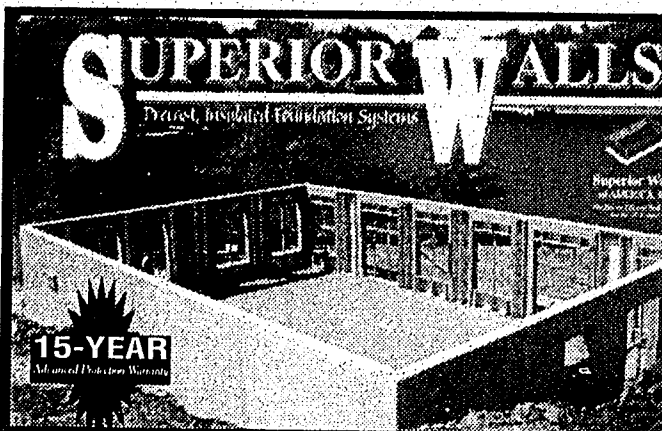

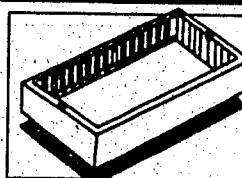

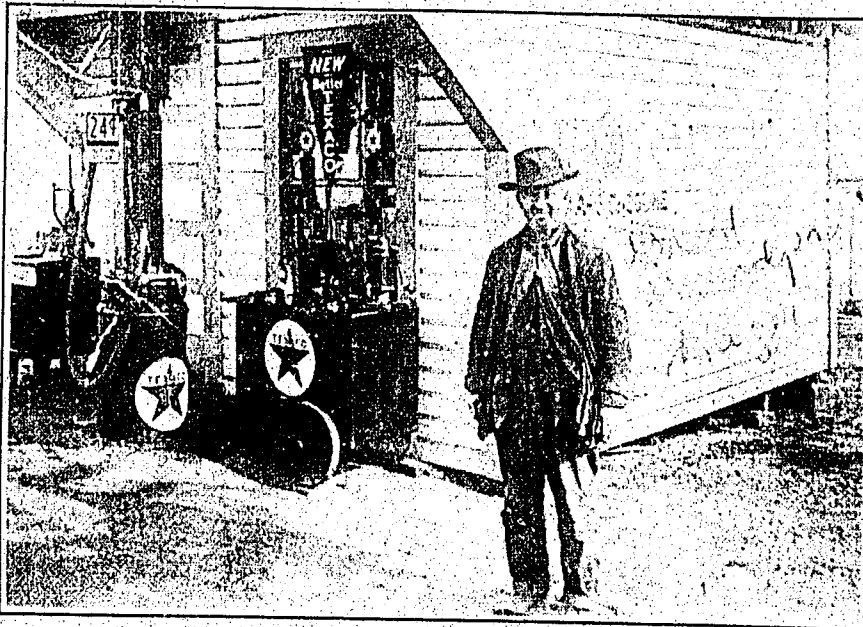

U-10 Blues strike Cup gold

For two members of the Charlotte Blue Under-10 North Carolina State Cup Challenge participating youth boys soccer team, success was especially rich earlier this spring. That's the case as Mooresville's Sam and Greg Conlon, twin brothers, were among members of that gold-medal finishing team that ousted a number of area entries to capture the age division championship. All four teams that made it to the event's semifinals hailed from the Charlotte area, with the local-based Lake Norman Extreme being handed a 4-1 loss by the Blues in the finals. Every member of the first-place finishing team, coached by Patrick Noonan, received an individual championship trophy. The Conlons, accepting their trophies from their coach, helped accounted for a total of 15 Mooresville area players advancing at least as far as the Cup Challenge's semifinals.



Duo earns Open stay

The hard part is over for a pair of entries with area ties competing in this week's Carolina's PGA North Carolina Open.

Now comes the harder part.

Competing locally at the Kannapolis Country Club, nearby The Point's head PGA pro Brian Glasco and reigning Iredell County Champion Lance Waggener each played well enough during the first two rounds to make the 60-player cut and earn the right to hang around during the final two rounds later this week.

They do so as more than half of the initial 156-player field was trimmed to the top 60 and ties following the first two rounds. Those making the midway mark cut are assured of finishing the four-day, 72-hole attraction that provides the majority of those who make their living working in golf to spend a few rounds playing it.

Of the two, it's Waggener, who emerged as the winner of last fall's inaugural Iredell County Golf Championship as its medalist, who is in the best of positions. One of a number of amateur players in the field, Waggener, of

Statesville, is the lowest scoring of them all through the midway mark. He turned in the second lowest round of the second round, with a six-under par 65, and sat third after two rounds. Waggener open play with a one-under par 71.

Meanwhile, Glasco, The Point's head pro, followed up his even-par round of 72 in the first round with a nearly as steady, one-over 73 in the second that was also good enough to weather the field's cut.

Both are competing in the Carolinas section of the PGA of America's major tournament that features of purse of \$52,000, with \$6,000 being awarded to the winner. The Carolinas section is the largest of all within the group, with nearly 2,000 members affiliated with some 900 facilities ranging from private country clubs to local driving ranges from across the two Carolinas as well as two Virginia counties.

The final round of the North Carolina Open is scheduled to take place today (Friday), after which final positions for all in the field and their respective winnings will be determined.
