Davidson hikes tax rate

Property owners in neighboring Davidson will pay more on their taxes during the coming year, following the town's adoption last week of a 2-cent increase in the property tax rate for fiscal year 2001-02.

Town Manager Leamon Brice said the increase was necessary because of the impending loss of state-shared revenues equal to \$144,000. The \$144,000 consists of intangibles tax revenue (\$49,000) and wholesale inventory tax revenue (\$95,000) the town had been receiving in reimbursements from the state.

The new budget includes a contingency of \$140,000, allowing the town to keep its

Fund Balance equal to 40% of operating expenses to comply with town policy and prepare for expected operating increases next year.

The following programs and projects are among those to be funded in the 2001-02 budget:

- An overall 3% cost of living and 2% merit increase for town employees.
- A partial funding of the proposed pay plan change for the Police Department.
- Pay plan adjustments in Planning, Public Works, and Parks and Recreation.
- Planning dollars for the N.C. 73 study and a Downtown Transportation Plan.
- Additional funding for

the Fire Incentive Pay Plan or standby pay for firemen.

• Debt service funding for land purchase.

• Debt service for the Boys and Girls Club and the Cornelius/Davidson Community Center.

• Partial funding of the town's local match for bike lanes.

Items cut to provide the \$140,000 contingency include:

- A take-home car plan for the Police Department.
- Additional funding for Boys and Girls Club, Davidson Housing Coalition, and the YMCA.
- Some lights at McEver Field.
- A restroom at Roosevelt Wilson Park.
