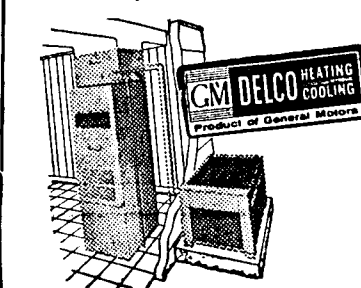

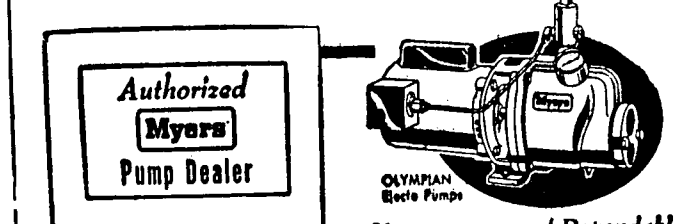

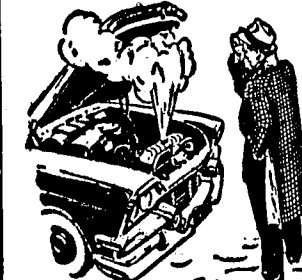

2nd Church's Stewardship Program To End On Sunday

Sunday, at 11:00 a.m., Second Presbyterian will close its five-week Stewardship program with a dedication service. Members of the congregation have been asked to sit together in family units for the dedicating of their 1964 pledge cards during a special passing of the offering plates. Appropriate music for the service is being planned by Minister of Music Michael Payne and the adult choir with an additional selection by Miss Mary Elisabeth Cobb, soloist.

Sunday's pledge service follows an intensive visitation program over the past two weeks by thirty-four trained men who have gone into the homes of the membership. Over and above the normal operating expenses of the church, the congregation is being challenged to consider four other areas of financial support in 1964.

Lorna Colson is from Mooreville. She has taught 29 years; 12 years in her first year of teaching.

John Stewart has taught 18 years; 10 here. A Norwood native, she is a Catawba College graduate.

Ethel Stewart hails from Tellico Plains, Tenn. She holds the M.A. from Furman College, and she has taught 16 years in Mooreville.

Mrs. Katherine Morrow is from Cornwell. Of her 34 years in teaching, 17 have been here. She was trained at Asheville Teachers College.

Phyllis Edmiston is from Durham. She is in her first year in the education field, now serving as school librarian. She was trained at ASTC.

Shirley Henson is a Watauga County product who earned her M.A. at ASTC. She has taught six years; four here.

Beth Nanney hails from Forest City. A veteran of nine years in the classroom, she is a graduate of ASTC.

Dave Richardson comes from Harmony. A veteran of three years in the profession, he trained at Appalachian.

Richard Lowder has spent three of his six years of teaching in Mooreville. A native of Montgomery County, he also attended ASTC.

Barbara Dennis is a freshman teacher. She is a native of Landis and an ASTC graduate.

Theresa Peiffer also is from Landis. She has taught 18 years, nine here. She trained at Catawba College.
