

## New Concept In Stewardship Promotion Planned Locally

As a part of Second Presbyterian Church's Fall Stewardship program, this Saturday evening at 7:30 p.m., the membership will be engaged in what is believed to be a new concept in stewardship promotion—a program which is being called "Neighborhood Fellowship Groups."

The idea arose among members of the diocese's stewardship committee, and, if it is successful, will be recommended to the General Council for possible use in other churches throughout the General Assembly.

The three hundred-fifty members of the church have been divided into eleven geographical areas. Within each area a home has been designated to which the members living in a given neighborhood will be invited by their respective host and hostess.

The one-hour program in the homes will be under the direction of a "Leader" who will follow a program outline consisting of a statement of purpose, scripture, prayer, meditation and comments about Christian stewardship, one's obligation to his church, testimonials from members of the group, a discussion of the significance of Pledge Sunday which will occur the following morning, the

## 'Operation Rescue' Tries To Salvage Scout Units

The Iredell Scout District has launched "Operation Rescue," a concentrated program designed to salvage the county's faltering Boy Scout program.

Sixteen of the county's scout units, nearly half the total, dropped their charters during the past year. All Explorer posts in the county, including three in Mooresville, currently are inactive. This lethargy has raced through all levels of the scouting program.

Last week, Iredell adult leaders met with council officials for a planning session. They discussed a crash program outlined two weeks ago for reactivating the faltering units.

The two men most directly concerned with "Operation Rescue" are Mitchell Mack and the Rev. Floyd Trexler, both of Mooresville. In January, Mack will begin duties as district chairman, and Trexler will take over the district's organization and extension.

Both men agree the sure cure for what ails scouting in Iredell is more adult interest in the program. In nearly every case of scout unit failure, the trouble has been a lack of adult leadership.

Here is how "Operation Rescue" works: Scoutmasters and submasters of existing units have been recruited for the campaign. They

have been divided into teams of three men and assigned to dropped units. The leaders will determine what caused the failure and, if anything, can be done about it.

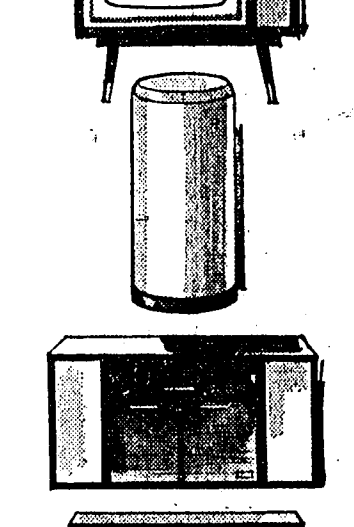
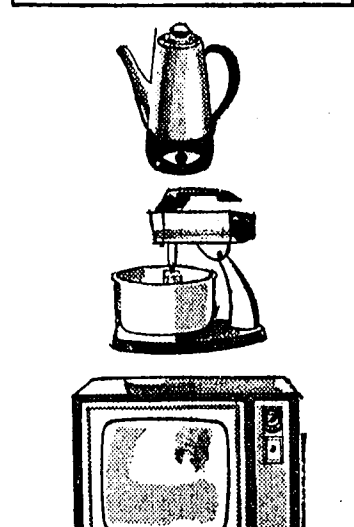
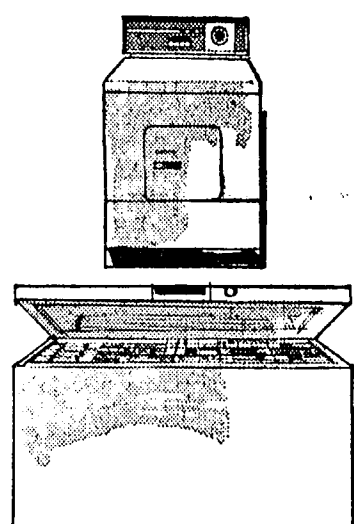
In at least 10 of the 16 cases, the county-level leaders feel the patient is critical but not terminally. Several now are being organized, and others will be chartered with new sponsors.

All county scout leaders involved in "Operation Rescue" were invited to attend the regular monthly district meeting last week at which the project was outlined.

The crash reactivation program will continue six weeks. At the end of that time, all units that have shown no signs of life will be abandoned.

These are the units in South Iredell that have dropped their charters during the year: Troop 353 at Broad Street Methodist Church (Mack said this unit is certain to reactivate), Troop 339 at Fair View Methodist Church, Troop 354 at Mooresville Church of God, Post 349, sponsored by the Mooresville Optimist Club; Post 361, sponsored by Draymore Manufacturing Corp.; Pack 322 at Vanderburg Methodist Church, Troop 173 and Pack 173 at Jones Memorial Methodist Church.
