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## Tour Of Kings Mountain Battleground Scheduled

Clubwomen of North Carolina, and especially nearby counties, have been invited to join the women of District Four at the Kings Mountain Women's Club building, 108 E. Mountain Street, on October 28 at 2 p. m. for a post-dinner meeting tour of the Kings Mountain Battleground. Mrs. Aubrey Mauney, past president of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs, Inc., said the trip will include the short ride to the battleground, a visit to the museum, audio-lecture, and a visit to the monument in honor of the Mountain Men and their patriot leaders. These men fought in the bloody battle on October 7, 1780, to secure the land from the oncoming British forces under Colonel Patrick Ferguson. They will also visit Ferguson's grave where the speakers' table will feature a miniature battlefield portrayed with redcoats, mountain soldiers and horses; dolls dressed by the Junior High School girls will represent fine ladies and mountain warriors, and place cards will carry through the theme of the Tercenary. Name badges are replicas of the monument. One area of the dining room will be dominated by a scene typical of a 1780 home, including a mannequin dressed as a Revolutionary belle, surrounded by furniture and household articles of the period.

Lyric poems limited to 28 lines will be entered in the Poetry Lover's contest and sonnets will be entered for the Speak Award. The Raleigh Woman's Club has honored a local club woman, Virginia Edgerton Simms, with the presentation of the award for the best 28-line narrative poem. Presented by the Gastonia Junior Woman's Club, the Zee Kincard Broekman Bowl is awarded for the best entry of a Junior clubwoman in any classification of poetry. In the field of Journalism the Stela Anderson Cup will be awarded for the best feature article on club activities.
