His underlying message, which he delivered with skill and heart-felt conviction, is that Christianity should be a constant and joyous companion and that the principles on which this country was founded are still valid guides to both a healthy Christian and free way of life.

Mr. Haggal is from a family of preachers, being the son and brother of preachers. He has been preaching since the age of twelve. He has been richly blessed in his chosen field, having doubled the membership of the West End Baptist Church in Rock Hill, S. C., during his four-and-a-half-year pastorate there. Since going to the Emerald Baptist Church in High Point in 1956 and taking over a church with a membership of forty-one, the group has grown to more than seven hundred members.

The Rev. Mr. Haggal attended North Greenville Junior College where he participated in athletics. He completed his formal education at Furman University. While at Furman he won several public speaking awards, served as associate pastor of a Baptist church, and during his senior year served as an evangelist throughout the Southern Baptist Convention.

Rev. Haggal was "Young Man of the Year" in Rock Hill in 1955 and has been active in civic affairs as chaplain of the Jaycees, member of the Rotary Club, the Health Board, Pastor-Adviser of the High Point College B.S.U., Board of the Y.M.C.A., the Executive Club, Salvation Army, the Boy Scout Council, and many others.

blindfold themselves. After this was done, the food was served. The Lions were asked to try and feed themselves. The result was frustration and a feeling of complete helplessness. After a couple of minutes, the blindfolds were removed and order restored. Scott had made his point, and vividly.

"What you felt during these few minutes is what every blind person feels all the time," Scott said, "and when you realize that fully half of the sight that is lost could have been saved, you begin to understand the importance of the work of the North Carolina Association for the Blind."

The White Cane Drive each year is the only source of revenue for the association. The N. C. Association for the Blind is a non-profit organization created and operated by Lions Clubs of the state.

"We're planning the biggest White Cane sale ever held in Mooresville," Scott told his fellow club members, "and if we are to be successful, we must have the support of everyone in Mooresville."

Each Lion was given a list of business firms, industries and key individuals to contact for contributions.

As a starter, Scott auctioned eight articles to the Lions. The articles, including a ham, a billfold and an electric toothbrush, were given to the club for the purpose. The auction netted \$50.80, and Scott said the money would go to the White Cane Drive.

**MOORESVILLE LIONS** are joining other North Carolina Lions in conducting the campaign. The state-wide goal is \$100,000; the local club's target is \$12,000.

A highlight of the drive will be the White Cane bangle sale downtown Saturday, September 21. This phase of the appeal will be under the direction of Bill Griffith. The collections will be made on streets in business districts by a dozen Junior High School girls.

All funds realized through the White Cane Drive are used to aid the blind and visually handicapped of North Carolina. This year's drive includes paying for eye examinations, eyeglasses, visual aids, sponsoring eye clinics, supporting the Eye Bank and providing gifts for hospitalized blind.
