2 New Stamps Now On Sale

One stamp commemorates the centennial anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation. The stamp was designed by George Olden and depicts a severed link in a massive black chain, against a blue background.

The second stamp marks the second anniversary of the Alliance for Progress, the program under which the American nations are pooling their resources for economic and social development.

This stamp was designed by William K. Schrage, and the multi-colored stamp has a bright blue background. A torch, pictured on the stamp, has a flame of two shades of green on a white background.

The initial printing order for the combined two stamps is 280 million.
