

THE PEOPLE SPEAK:

The United States' moon-exploration program hit another snag Sunday, February 2, when the camera-carrying Ranger 6 crashed into the moon without telecasting a single picture.

The 804-pound spacecraft, launched three days previously from Cape Kennedy, performed beautifully up to the final 10 minutes of flight, when its six cameras were supposed to begin taking a series of 3,000 pictures from 900 miles high down to impact.

But they failed to operate.

It was the sixth straight failure in the Ranger program, which so far has cost some \$168 million, figured at about \$28 million a shot.

A spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said three more launchings of identical Ranger spacecraft were scheduled this year, with Ranger 7 being ready to go within a month.

Since all of these Ranger launchings are preliminary work in the long-range plan of putting a man on the moon, the Moores-

ville Tribune's roving reporter asked the following question this week:

Do you believe man ever will set foot on the moon?

The answers of the four on-the-streets questioned were as follows:

CINDY NANTZ, Troutman High School student, route 4: "No, I don't believe man ever will set foot on the moon. I don't believe the moon was created for us to live on."

MRS. JOHN ALLEN NEILL, Douglas Aircraft, 224 South Academy street: "I definitely believe this will happen. I base my thinking on the advances we have made in the past 20 to 25 years. I've got faith. I'd say we'll put a man on the moon within the next 30 years—no, say within the next century."

ROBERT KERR, department store manager, 823 North Main street: "Yes. With our boys, we'll hit the moon. I won't say when, however."

FRANK WEDDINGTON, Cannon Mills, Landis: "I don't think man ever will set foot on the moon... no time soon at least."

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


