Off to a running start!

IN RECENT YEARS, the economic development of the South has set a mighty fast pace. According to a just-released U. S. Department of Commerce report, the South in the past decade raced ahead of the nation in rates of growth in 26 of the 31 industrial and commercial activities surveyed.
