Pearson also reports that he, along with the team, is well aware of the fine support the fans have given the team during the year. It is a known fact that a large delegation of Mooreville fans could well root the locals to a victory in this top notch match of the year for Mooreville graduates.

The last eight minutes of play were the real game as far as the fans were concerned. With only three minutes remaining in the game, East tied the score at 46-46. Bowman called time out and recharged his group who immediately took the floor and pulled the game out of the fire.

Tommy Deal was the key in the final drive. Deal scored six of the locals in the lead. Deal scored 27 points in the contest, of which 18 came from the charity stripe in 15 attempts.

The locals had moved to a 12-10 advantage at the end of the first half, only to see the game fade away in the second two stanzas.

Sherry Sherrill, with six points, was the top scorer for the locals with Sandy Torrence contributing five, Manchie Poore got two and Susan Cooke made a foul shot good for one point.

Dresina Walters, Susan Brown and Donna Helms also saw action for the locals, but failed to score. The Devil five started off like they were going to run the East team right out of the gym in out-scoring the visitors 23-14 in the first period.

Early in the second half, Tim Roach and Mike Robinson were the only effort for the locals as each connected for two baskets and the score narrowed to 39-35 at the end of the third period.

Bowman's charges, led by guard Tommy Deal, racked up their third straight league conquest with a 38-46 decision over the Oakwood team.

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
