Rules, Deadlines, And Awards Announced For Annual Flower Show At War Memorial

Rules, awards and deadlines for the flower show "Love Makes The World Go Round" have been announced. The show will begin at 10:00 a. m. and continue until 10:00 p. m. at the War Memorial on Thursday, February 12.

Rules and deadlines for the show are as follows:

1. Entries must be registered by February 12.
2. Exhibits must be in place by 9:45 a. m., February 13. No entry may be removed before 10 p. m., February 13.
3. Only one entry in each class may be made by an exhibitor.
4. Flowers used in Artistic Classes need not be grown by exhibitor.
5. Foliage is allowed in all arrangement classes.
6. After entry in an arrangement class has been accepted, exhibitor must provide substitute if unable to exhibit.

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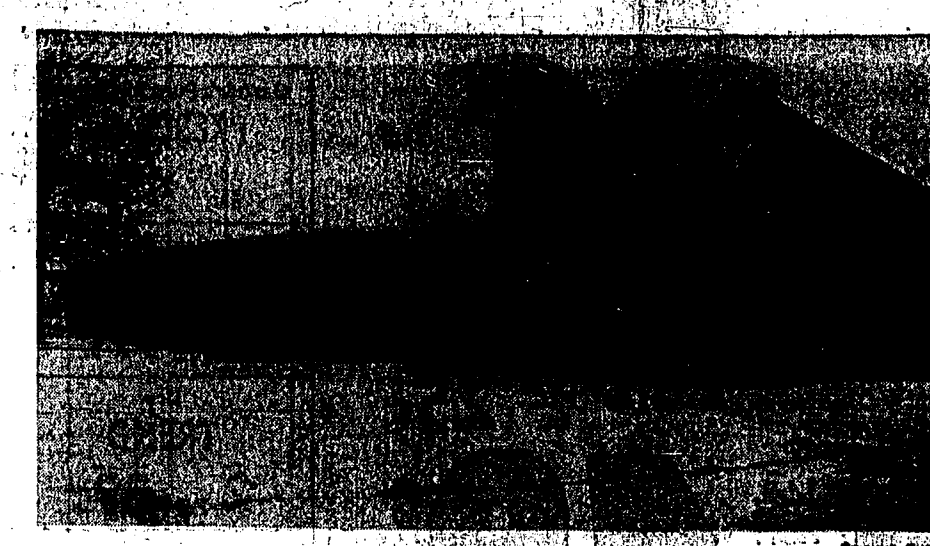

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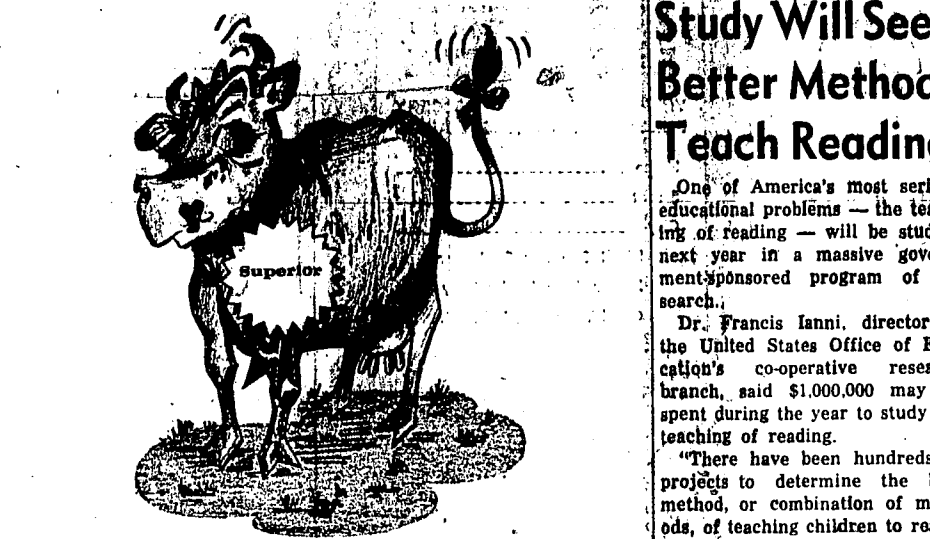

Study Will Seek Better Methods Teach Reading

One of America's most serious educational problems — the teaching of reading — will be studied next year in a massive government-sponsored program of research.

Dr. Francis Ianni, director of the United States Office of Education's co-operative research branch, said \$1,000,000 may be spent during the year to study the teaching of reading.

"There have been hundreds of projects to determine the best method, or combination of methods, of teaching children to read," Ianni said, "but there has never been such a large-scale attack on the problem as the one now planned."

Teachers generally concede that reading is the most important single skill that can be taught to a child. Poor development of reading abilities is the major cause of scholastic dropouts, experts have determined.

Drop-outs, in turn, often lead to crime, unemployment, and the need for dependence on expensive welfare and rehabilitation programs.

Dr. Ianni said that the forthcoming studies of teaching methods will cover large city, small town, and rural schools and that the experience and opinions of teachers will receive major attention.

plete payments to the local organizations — the Christian Mission, Boy and Girl Scouts, Recreation Commission, library, Red Cross and Rescue Squad. The \$210,000 of the agency's one paid employee also must be paid. The total amount of money needed, then, is \$1,210,000. On hand now is \$10,000.

The treasurer said nearly \$5,000 still is promised in pledges that contributors spread over several months.

"We are, I would say, in excellent health," retiring President Ross said, "I am very much in favor of maintaining the emergency fund this money above our budget commitments will go into. That we were able to assist the Red Cross blood program that has meant so much to this community proves, I think, the vital importance of having this reserve available."

Officials of the local Red Cross chapter on hand for the breakfast agreed with Ross. They said the success of the blood service program begun last year would have been possible without the additional gift from United Fund.

Last year's campaign Chairman Simpson reminded the group the drive collected \$28,442 — \$825 more than the goal, and \$1,273 more than the 1962 campaign total. The local drive was the first in the state to reach its goal last year.

"This kind of project represents hard work by the whole community," Simpson said, "and congratulations are in order for all who were a part of it."

Simpson awarded a special certificate of appreciation to Rufus Dalton, head of the Chemsun-Templon plants that went over their U.F. goals within two hours after the campaign opened. Piques commending them for their role in the drive went to each division chairman and to Ross.

In retiring as president, Ross said the group his part in the campaign had brought "a feeling of being, association with fine people and a sense of mutual accomplishment."

James Ross presented a report from the committee that reviewed the local U.F. constitution. The members accepted the new document for study. It will come up for adoption at the next annual meeting.
