We'd Like To See Homegrown Play At Home

Like show tunes? You'll love "Listen to Your Heart." Never heard of it? You will, dear hearts, you will. You do remember the three Mooresville housewives who spent two years, off and on, writing a musical comedy, completing it about a year ago. You recall their play was the apple in the eyes of the judges who select plays for the Carolina Drama Festival, a festival sponsored by the Carolina Dramatic Association and held in Chapel Hill each April. Well, that gets was wrote was "Listen to Your Heart."

The play, two and a quarter hours of fast-paced delight, was only the sixth full-length production ever chosen for presentation in the 46-odd years of the Drama Festival. The talented trio responsible for the play is made up of Ellen Johnston, Aggie Neel and Kirby Horton. Their gift to the theater world is entirely their own, they dreamed up the plot, wrote the script, the music, the lyrics, the whole bit.

Because the play involves elaborate staging and delicate orchestration and choreography, there was not enough time to offer it at last year's festival. It was booked for the 1964 event. The amateur playwrights learned recently a troupe from Wilmington will present their play in the festival this April. The acting group, a member of the National Thespian Society, already is at work on the production.

This sort of brings us up to date, but we want to make more noise about "Listen to Your Heart." Last week, we had the pleasure of hearing some of the music from the play, and it's darn good. The people who took the play off paper and made it a living, laughing thing were the same who taped the entire score for entry in the Drama Festival. The music was sung by Mrs. George Hutto and Gene Auten. Others in the cast were Mr. and Mrs. B. Davidson, Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Davidson, Mrs. Charlie Gates and Harvey Millaps.

All these talented singer-actors are Mooresville products, which brings us to our final point. All of us who are interested in and proud of "Listen to Your Heart" won't be able to see it in Chapel Hill. We shouldn't be deprived of the opportunity to witness what our own local ladies have wrought. There ought to be a way we could present this fine, homegrown entertainment here. If it can't be done locally, couldn't we bring the Wilmington group here? There ought to be a way.

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
