## IN NORTH CAROLINA DURING '63

### Capital Investment In New Plants And Expansions Break All Records

Governor Terry Sanford announced today that North Carolina broke all records for capital investment in new plants and expansions during 1963. During the twelve-month period projects involving the expenditure of \$386,928,000 were announced. This exceeded the previous high of \$278,447,000 in 1961 by more than \$107,000,000, an increase of approximately 38 per cent.

Governor Sanford pointed out that the record for 1963 represents a jump of some \$107,000,000 over the figure of \$229,928,000 of 1962, or more than 46 per cent.

The new plants and expansions will provide an estimated 31,065 new jobs for North Carolina workers, with potential earnings of approximately \$106,131,000 annually, as compared with 24,997 new jobs and an annual payroll estimated at \$79,555,000 in 1962.

Another indication of the unprecedented industrial progress of the State last year cited by Governor Sanford was the total of 670 projects—Of these, 192 were new plants and 478 expansions. The bulk of the new investments, however, will be in new plants which account for slightly more than \$228 million, or almost 62 per cent of the total, and a similar proportion of the prospective new jobs.

Among the various types of industry, chemicals and allied products led the field with almost \$108 million in new projects and an additional \$8.2 million the expansion of existing facilities. Next were textile mills in which \$44.5 million was scheduled for investment in new plants. A total of \$72.3 million was scheduled for expansion on expansions of existing plants.

Governor Sanford called particular attention to the fact that 109 textile plants, almost one of every two, are operating in the State, planned or carried out expansions last year. This is indicative, he pointed out, of the sound condition and progress in North Carolina's largest industry. Forty-one new plants were also announced during the year.

Another wholesome development cited by the Governor as securing this year was the substantial growth in the metalworking field. The review showed nine new plants to manufacture machinery (except electrical) whose capital investments exceeded \$32 million. Established plants in this category announced expansions amounting to more than \$22 million.

Ten new electrical machinery plants with a combined \$38 million and 13 operating firms announced expansions amounting to \$10 million for new plants and \$19 million for expansions.

Food and kindred products, which are being heavily emphasized by the Sanford administration, showed 13 new plants and 64 expansions scheduling more than \$8.5 million in new capital outlays.

Employment, although affected by seasonal variations, has been high during the year. The rate of unemployment in North Carolina was 3.9 per cent of the state's labor force in mid-November compared with a national ratio of 5.4 per cent.

In discussing the record breaking development for 1963, Governor Sanford termed it a team accomplishment with numerous agencies and individuals having a part.

"Without these various agencies working as the Tar Heel team, it would not have been possible to have made the record established in 1963," Governor Sanford stated. "Among those who have made major contributions are the numerous local developers and citizens, the utility companies and railroads, and the various other agencies and individuals."

"I should like to express my appreciation, in particular, to Hargrove Bowles, Jr., chairman of the Board of Conservation and Development, Director Robert L. Stallings, Jr., James R. Hinkle, Industrial Development Administrator and their staff."

"These people are dedicated to the strengthening and diversification of North Carolina's economic base. They work long hours in their efforts to contribute to the growth and prosperity of the State."

"At no period has competition for new industry been as keen as it is today. We cannot relax if we expect to stay ahead. Although our attainments have been remarkable, we have set bigger goals for next year. These can be reached if all groups continue to work as they have this past year."
