Merchant Directors Schedule Session

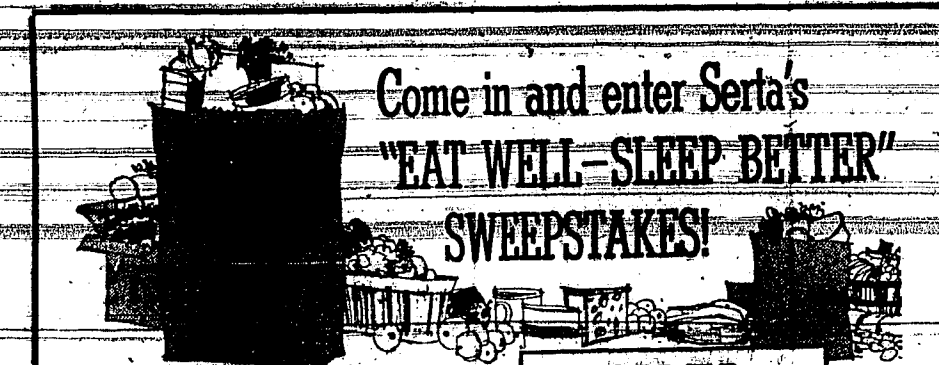

Citizens S&L Pays \$117,700 In Dividends

Dividends, totaling \$117,700, were paid by the Citizens Savings and Loan Association during 1963, an official of the firm announced this week.

John D. Beam, the financial house's secretary and treasurer, reported that \$57,600 in dividends was paid on June 30 and the December 30 dividend total was \$59,900.

Dividends were paid at the rate of four per cent per annum. The association's assets increased \$388,000 during the 12-month period just ended, to an all-time high of \$2,600,000, according to Beam.

—The financial house made 125 loans during 1963, and added 200 new savings accounts, bringing the total savings accounts to 4,410 or \$3,140,000, Beam stated.

Officers of the association, which was organized in 1922, are: E. V. Fields, president; T. C. DeWitt, vice president; W. J. Haselden, president; and John D. Beam, secretary and treasurer.

—Mrs. Charles Brawley talked on the federation of churches. Mrs. H. A. Poston, president, presided over the business session and the secretaries gave their reports.

—During the 12-month period just ended, the association's assets increased \$388,000. This was the greatest increase in assets in any one year in the history of the firm.

—The association, according to Beam, paid its 1963 dividends totaling \$117,700 during the year just ended — \$57,600 on June 30 and \$59,900 on December 30. Dividends are paid at the rate of four per cent per annum.

—During the past year, 525 new savings accounts were added bringing the total savings accounts to 4,400 or \$2,600,000.

—Loans were increased \$319,000 during the year, bringing the total loans to \$2,201,000.

—In keeping with good business practice, \$97,891.22 was added to the association's reserve accounts, making the total reserves of the association \$985,500.78, Beam stated.

—And, as an added protection, the association keeps in reserve \$333,481.88 in government bonds and has a credit standing of 94 million with the Federal Home Loan Bank of Greensboro.

—At present, Beam pointed out, "there is every reason to believe the 1964 business year will be prosperous, both in our national economy and also in our own business operations."

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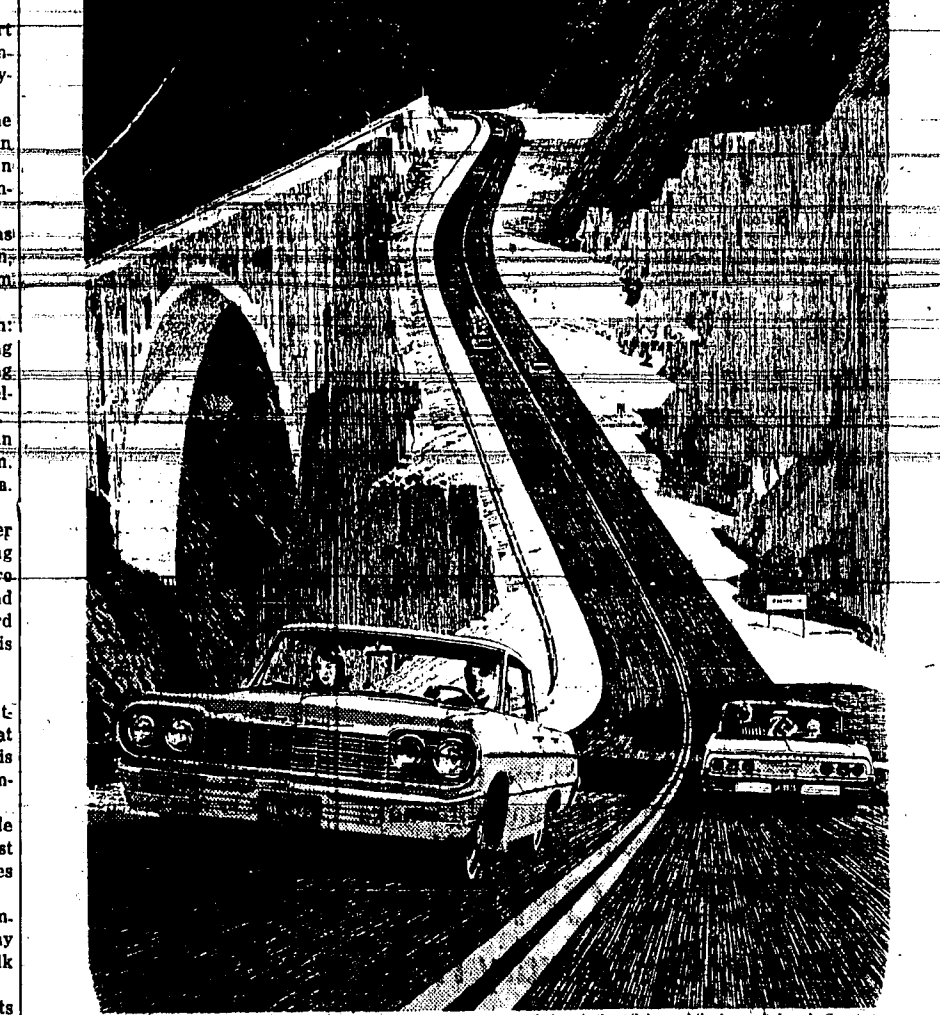
