Rumple Reports To People

Continuing a custom of long standing, Sheriff Charles Rumble again this year tendered his annual report to the people of the county through the board of county commissioners.

The report was presented to the commissioners Monday.

Sheriff Rumble's report shows that his department was instrumental in putting \$12,645.30 in the county coffers during the past year.

The department handled 5,412 complaints, made 830 arrests, destroyed six illicit liquor distilleries and captured and destroyed 2,750 gallons of illicit beer.

OFFENSE CLASSIFICATIONS

Town Adopts Retirement Program For Employees

Mooreville's 65 municipal employees have a retirement plan. The Town Board this week adopted a retirement benefits program for which all on the town's payroll are eligible, was made retroactive to January 1.

The acceptance of the town's new retirement program for employees came only after painstaking research into benefits offered by a number of policies. The plan now in effect is administered by a state agency, the N. C. Local Governmental Employees Retirement System. Policies of private insurance companies were considered by the town board.

The retirement plan was proposed at budget time last July. At that time, Brooks explained the workings of the state-administered plan, and he recommended adoption of a similar program for local municipal employees.

The retirement plan is financed jointly by the town and the employees. The town board set aside \$12,500 in the current budget to pay the town's share of the program. The figure was based on the assumption the plan would be adopted in time to be effective for three-quarters of the 1963-64 fiscal year. It would be applied retroactively to January 1, 1963.

Brooks said the real beauty of the new retirement program is that its benefits are based on years of service and salary. The years a present employee is enrolled under the plan will not determine the amount of his retirement payments.

For example, Mooreville "has two employees who are eligible for retirement, with maximum benefits, after the required one month under the program. One employee has 34 years service; the other 33.
